CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE



2024 was a year marked by significant regional and global challenges and defined by volatility and unpredictability. This holds particularly true for the region covered by the Gulf Research Center (GRC) involving the six countries of the Gulf Cooperation Council as well as Iran, Iraq, and Yemen. Throughout the year, these countries found themselves confronted by numerous developments that had a direct impact on their national security as well as their economic and social advancement.

The GRC thoroughly believes that the advancement of knowledge and the fostering of dialogue is the best manner through which to address the many regional and international issues of concern

Taking this into consideration, and Through a broad spectrum of activities and initiatives, the GRC attempted to put developments into their proper context and contribute to a better and deeper understanding of the critical dynamics at play.

Research and analysis remains the core of the GRC's activities. Our Foreign Relations Research Program covered various topics, including Gulf-Asia, Gulf-Europe, Gulf-Latin America, and Gulf-Nordic-Baltic relations. A notable achievement was the publication of a series of ten research papers on the GCC-NB8 Relations Program, launched in July 2023 and continuing throughout 2024. The Environmental Security and Sustainability Program held events both at COP 29 in Azerbaijan as well as COP 16 on Desertification in Riyadh. Numerous other initiatives were promoted through the Gulf Labor Markets and Migration (GLMM) Program as well as the Cultural & Media Program.

The Tafahum wa Tabadul Project further exemplified the GRC's role in fostering regional dialogue. Through high-level policy workshops that brought together officials from the GCC, Yemen, Iraq, and Iran, the project worked to sustain and deepen the momentum of regional cooperation. These sessions aimed to identify practical mechanisms for collaboration, underscoring GRC's commitment to tangible, action-oriented outcomes.

A significant milestone in 2024 was the establishment of the GRC Foundation's new office in Brussels. This strategic expansion marked a critical step in enhancing Gulf-Europe relations. The office is set to serve as a hub for in-depth research on evolving dynamics between the Gulf Cooperation

Council (GCC) and the European Union (EU). By focusing on mutual interests and fostering academic excellence, the office represents the GRC's commitment to bridging gaps and promoting understanding between these two pivotal regions.

GRC's calendar of events in 2024 included the 14th annual Gulf Research Meeting with more than 350 participants, the Gstaad Middle East Dialogue, the OIC-GRC Symposium, as well as the GRC's support for the inaugural Gulf Studies Symposium held in Washington, DC. Specialized ambassador roundtable meetings addressing relations with Central Asia, Latin America, and MIKTA countries provided platforms for nuanced, region-specific dialogue.

On the executive training front, the GRC held its Gulf In-Depth Executive Learning Program in Riyadh and the three-module Global Leadership Program in Geneva together with the Geneva Center for Security Policy.

In terms of knowledge dissemination, 2024 saw the GRC release a wide range of publications, including commentaries and analyses, policy briefs, and research papers on various subjects. Reports included GCC-Sub-Saharan Africa relations, the Swiss Economic Outlook, and the GCC-Africa agriculture sector. Together, these publications not only address diverse and pressing issues, providing valuable insights to both policymakers and

academics, but more importantly provide a regional Gulf perspective to the many issues impacting the region. Our media presence and conference participation provided an additional mechanism to contribute to the policy debates.

Collaboration remained a cornerstone of GRC's approach. Throughout the year, the GRC strengthened its partnerships with research institutions and universities both within the Gulf region and globally. This included signing several new memoranda of understanding, which laid the groundwork for future joint initiatives and projects.

One of the most notable moments of the year was the recognition of GRC Chairman Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, who received the prestigious Medal of Knight in the National Order of Merit from French President Emmanuel Macron. This honor, conferred on May 21 at the Residence of France in Riyadh, celebrated Dr. Sager's unwavering dedication to strengthening Saudi-French relations.

All of the above would not have been possible without the dedication and hard work of GRC's global team. Their unwavering commitment has been instrumental in driving the GRC's mission: Knowledge for All. As GRC looks ahead to 2025, it does so with a sense of purpose, building on the foundations laid in past years to continue its vital work in fostering understanding, dialogue, and cooperation in an ever-changing world.

In addition, as a non-profit organization, GRC injects all income into new programs and activities. The GRC established its headquarters in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia with offices in Jeddah, Brussels, Geneva, Cambridge, and a support office in Dubai.






The Gulf Research Center Foundation Brussels (GRCF-B)

This is accomplished through numerous projects that the GRCF-B carries out, often in partnership with other research organizations and the European Union. The GRCF-B is situated in the capital of the European Union, the heart of Europe, and is of great benefit to its work.



The objectives of the GRCF Brussels office are:


- Enhance Gulf-Europe relations through a world-class facility providing research and analysis.

- Build a network of relevant stakeholders from politics, business, media, and academia in a holistic effort to contribute to mutually beneficial ties.
- Promote economic partnerships and enhance business-to-business ties with new initiatives and dialogues.
- Identify and propose new areas of cooperation outside the current scope.



- Support a widening cultural dialogue between Europe and the Gulf region.
- Promote youth and research exchanges.

Cooperation with renowned research institutions and other organizations in Europe is an essential part of the Foundation's work. The GRCF Brussels works to build networks across all official and unofficial channels, thus broadening and enhancing relations between the Gulf region and Europe.

The Foundation qualifies to receive funding and participate in programs supported by international organizations, the European Union, and various independent international foundations. Under the laws of the constituent states of the European Union, donors based in the European Union are eligible to receive tax benefits for supporting the work of the GRC Foundation Brussels.



The Gulf Research Center Foundation (GRCF)

The Gulf Research Center Foundation (GRC Foundation or GRCF) was established in 2007 in Geneva, Switzerland. It is, by definition, a non-profit institution and an umbrella organization under which research, training, and educational programs about the Gulf region are developed and implemented. The GRC Foundation conducts research on Gulf issues, promotes academic excellence in and about the Gulf region, and ensures objective and comprehensive analysis and information about this vital part of the world. This is accomplished through numerous projects that GRCF carries out, often in partnership with other research organizations. The location of the GRCF in Geneva, a place where exchanges of ideas on global governance and security regularly take place, has been crucial for its success. Cooperation with renowned research institutions, universities, and other organizations is essential to the Foundation's work.



In 2011, the Foundation was awarded special consultative status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations. The GRCF is also accredited by the governing council of the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP). In 2012, the GRCF, together with the Migration Policy Centre (MPC) of the European University Institute (EUI) in Florence, established the Gulf Labour Markets and Migration (GLMM) Programme, promoting better understanding and policies in these critical domains for the Gulf and the countries of origin of the migrants. The Foundation qualifies to receive funding from and participate in programs supported by international organizations, the European Union, the United States, and various independent international foundations. Under the laws of Switzerland and the Canton of Geneva, donors based in Switzerland are eligible to receive tax benefits for supporting the work of the GRC Foundation.





The Gulf Research Centre Cambridge (GRCC) was established in August 2009 through a cooperative effort between the Gulf Research Center Foundation in Geneva and the Prince Alwaleed Bin Talal Centre of Islamic Studies at the University of Cambridge. The primary goal of the GRCC is to advance education and research on political, economic, social, environmental, security, and energy issues related to the Gulf region. One of the critical aspects of the work of the GRCC is organizing the annual Gulf Research Meeting at the University of Cambridge. More information about the Gulf Research Meeting is available here.

Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center, received the prestigious Medal of Knight in the National Order of Merit from French President Emmanuel Macron on Tuesday, May 21, 2024 in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia. This recognition symbolizes Dr. Abdulaziz Sager's strong bond and cumulative achievements in enhancing relations between Saudi Arabia and France.

The ceremony was hosted and organized by H.E. Ambassador Ludovic Pouille, France's Ambassador to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, at the Residence of France in Riyadh. Distinguished guests and EU ambassadors were among those who attended the ceremony. After being awarded the Medal, Dr. Sager gave an acceptance speech where he extended his appreciation to President Macron, the government of France, the French Foreign Ministry, the French embassy in Riyadh, and Ambassador Pouille, as well as outlined the growing relations between Saudi Arabia and France.



He concluded his speech by re-emphasizing that through his organization, the Gulf Research Center, he and his team will continue to work toward strengthening the relations between Saudi Arabia and France in various dimensions, ranging from economics and energy to culture, defense, security, and political coordination. He reiterated his commitment to using all capacities to their fullest to distribute knowledge, raise understanding about both countries, and propose strategies for further nourishing and developing the existing ties between the two countries.



Opening of GRC's Brussels Office

Since then, the GRC has engaged in numerous projects, also with the European Union, to better understand the dynamics underpinning mutual ties. The ability to work from the EU's headquarters in Brussels will allow for further engagement with all EU institutions with numerous events planned during 2025.

GRC Foreign Relations Program

The Gulf Research Center's mission is to further information and knowledge relating to the Gulf by providing a comprehensive, independent, and credible platform for advanced research on GCC politics, economics, defense, security, and social issues, and their implications and relevance. The scope of the research programs is defined in coordination with the GRC Academic Board and is continuously updated to ensure that the research is in accordance with current issues of concern

The GRC undertakes research on all elements impacting policy-making in the Gulf, including: political systems and development, foreign relations of the Gulf, defense and security issues, the economy, as well as environmental issues and the role of energy and its regional and worldwide dimensions. In each of its research programs, it is the objective of the GRC and its extensive community of researchers and contributors to shed light on unexplored issues and relationships that are and will be of increased importance both for the Gulf region and the rest of the world.

The Foreign Relations Program at the Gulf Research Center (GRC) serves as a cornerstone for advancing the study of the Gulf's evolving relationships with various territorial regions across the globe. Through rigorous research and analysis, the program explores key areas of cooperation and challenges in Gulf-Asia, Gulf-Latin America, Gulf-Sub-Sahara Africa, Gulf-Nordic-Baltic, and Gulf-Europe relations. By fostering a deeper understanding of these interconnected dynamics, the program aims to contribute to policy-making and strengthen the Gulf's role as a pivotal player in global affairs.

Structure of the research programs

- 1. Research and analysis: The core of each program is substantive academic research with a particular emphasis on policy issues, and their implications and relevance. - 2. Conferences **GRC** and workshops: is active in organizing conferences and workshops that complement its various research programs, with the aim to create more clarity within and interaction among the policy and the academic communities. GCC-ASEAN Webinar: Looking Forward: Outlines for Developing GCC-ASEAN Cooperation

January 18, 2024



Participating Speakers' Institutions















The Gulf Research Center (GRC) held the first session of its GCC-ASEAN webinar series entitled "Looking Forward: Outlines for Developing GCC-ASEAN Cooperation" on January 18, 2024. The event focused on the status of relations and the priorities related to the "ASEAN-Gulf Cooperation Council Framework of Cooperation 2024-2028." Dr. Christian Koch, the Director of Research at the GRC, moderated the session.



In his welcoming remarks, Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the GRC, emphasized the importance of developing stronger academic and think tank network relations with

ASEAN countries. He also discussed the potential for expanding trade, labor markets, investments, and innovation ties. Dr. Sager suggested that attention should be given to bringing about a GCC-ASEAN free trade agreement which would open the door for further cooperation in areas like renewable energy, food security, and the digital economy. The establishment of a GCC-ASEAN business council to facilitate private-sector engagement could also be beneficial.



Dr. Yeo Lay Hwee, Senior Fellow at the Singapore Institute of International Affairs (SIIA), expressed her aims for more dialogue between think tanks in Southeast

Asia and the GCC countries as both regions face a lot of complex challenges. Their work together could therefore assist policymakers from the regions to overcome some of these issues. She highlighted that the current broader geopolitical and geoeconomic developments in the last few years have inevitably led the two regional blocs to strengthen their engagements with each other to build greater strategic alignment at the regionto-region level. In terms of economic relations in 2022, trade between the two blocs increased from USD 85.2 billion in 2021 to USD 110 billion, with the current trade volume reaching close to USD 140 billion. Trade has not only increased but also diversified from trading primarily in crude oil and fossil fuels and associated logistics to various products and services, from electronics and machinery to other high-growth sectors, such as food, financial services, and e-commerce.



Mr. Newin Sinsiri, Advisor on Geopolitics from the Thailand Development Research Institute (TDRI), highlighted how the ASEAN-Gulf Cooperation Council

Framework of Cooperation could promote more economic cooperation through the increased role of private sectors and shared experience on economic integration in terms of policy dialogue on trade and investment. He underlined the importance of people-to-people connectivity with increased cultural exchanges, knowledge sharing, trade fairs, and other mechanisms essential to narrowing the developmental gap between the two regions.



Dr. Hasan Alhasan, Senior Fellow for Middle East Policy at the International Institute for Strategic Studies (IISS), stressed how the GCC is expressing interest in

engaging more substantively with ASEAN and how this is part of the GCC's broader strategic diversification plan, given the fact that the Gulf states are attempting to diversify their security, political, and economic relations away from the West, and looking for a broader set of partners. Dr. Alhasan reiterated how the GCC-ASEAN relationship remains centered on energy but he stated that there is also an increased focus on new emerging and renewable forms of energy. For the GCC states, the strategy is to cement themselves as central energy players and play a key role in the transition towards newer forms of energy.



Mr. Khin Maung Zaw, Joint Secretary from the Myanmar Institute of Strategic and International Studies, highlighted the importance of food security and how ASEAN can provide

food supply security for the GCC states. He also identified digital currency and financial technology as another area that both sides should engage in. He suggested that the GCC and ASEAN, as regional blocs, can create a common market framework for food, marine products, livestock, and agriculture.



Dr. Ngo Di Lan, Research Fellow at the Institute for Foreign Policy and Strategic Studies (IFPSS – DAV), stressed the importance of fostering cooperation on both the multilateral

and bilateral levels. He identified strengthening tourism flows between the two regions as important to further developing infrastructure, creating business opportunities, and boosting trade and investment flows.



Dr. Mansour Almarzoqi, Director of the Center for Strategic Studies & American Studies at the Prince Saud Al Faisal Institute for Diplomatic Studies, re-emphasized the institutional

instrument of contact and that to understand one another better, one must develop efficient ways of communication through education. He argued that the two blocs were still in an 'exploration stage' of developing their relations with one another. This includes, for example, the divergent security alliances of all the GCC and ASEAN member states and how certain countries have better relations with China than others. It should also be acknowledged that some GCC countries have stronger ties with ASEAN countries than others.



Andrea Molina, Chief Research Officer (Migration Studies) at the Center for International Relations and Strategic Studies, Foreign Service Institute, highlighted the importance

of making a conscious effort to bridge the gaps and build a stronger foundation, especially now that the challenges both regional blocs are facing, whether they be economic, geopolitical, or environmental, do not adhere to the arbitrary boundaries. She emphasized the waning influence of traditional global powers, coupled with the rise of new players, which created a shifting landscape. This new reality requires collective solutions that transcend borders in order to better face the apparent challenges in these volatile regions. It also reflects the policies of the GCC countries which are seeking diversification beyond their immediate allies.

Speakers suggested that the holding of the GCC-ASEAN summit in Rivadh in October 2023 should now be followed up with more focused ministerial meetings and exchanges. At the same time, many specific issues need to be addressed, which requires a second track of experts, where the cooperation of the regional blocks can examine what specific functional collaboration between the GCC and ASEAN can look like. Important issues mentioned were food security, AI technology, and renewables. The main focus on the second track of experts is to coordinate specific working groups between GCC and ASEAN experts to develop concrete ideas that can ultimately be proposed at the political level. On the societal track, peopleto-people cooperation should be enhanced and focused on building networks and having regular exchange mechanisms. This will allow for greater familiarity to be created and generate a greater sense of understanding to be promoted between the two regional blocs, eventually moving out of the exploratory phase and towards regular institutionalized cooperation.

Overall, the session put forward several suggestions for policy consideration:

- First, ASEAN should consider having the GCC as a comprehensive dialogue partner and invite the GCC to regular regional meetings, such as the 'ASEAN Regional Forum,' to enhance regional-to-regional cooperation and institutional relationships.
- Second, a comprehensive institutional framework should sustain the current GCC-ASEAN momentum, with more regular dialogue and joint working groups.
- Third, the importance of regular, structured, and institutional contact between GCC and ASEAN and the potential for cooperation in renewable energy, food security, and the digital economy should be emphasized.

- Fourth, it is essential to focus on the context of the rise of the GCC as a geopolitical global player, coupled with the return of regionalism.
- Fifth, there is a dire need for the think tank community to promote and educate both GCC and ASEAN regional bloc communities and understand each of the regional perspectives better to develop more pertinent and realistic policies.
- Sixth, safeguarding labor rights by the Global Compact for Immigration must be undertaken.
- Seventh, securing vital trade routes and economic interests to ensure regional stability and cooperation will also require that robust maritime security measures between both regions be increased.

















Visit of a Delegation from the Master of Strategic Studies Program of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's National Defense University February 6, 2024



A delegation from the Master of Strategic Studies Program (No. 15) of Saudi Arabia's National Defense University, which included a number of the program's faculty and students, both military and civilian, visited the Gulf Research Center's (GRC) office in Riyadh, to learn about the GRC's research activities and programs. Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center, and the rest of the GRC's team received the delegation. The GRC provided an overview of the Kingdom's perspectives on regional developments as part of the visit, as well as discussed potential training program courses that the GRC will host on various security issues.





China-GCC Webinar: Navigating the Dynamics of GCC-China Relations

The Gulf Research Center (GRC) and the Shanghai Institute for International Studies (SIIS) held a webinar entitled 'Navigating the Dynamics of GCC-China Relations' on February 7, 2024. The event focused on the status and priorities of GCC-China relations and aimed to explore how China's diplomatic efforts could align with the regional interests and concerns of the Gulf states. The webinar discussed China's role as a regional stabilizer and to what extent China can maintain this momentum. It also examined how GCC-China relations may evolve in the coming years and their impact on the global geopolitical landscape.

The speakers touched upon the uncertainties in the Middle East region and questions surrounding US involvement. They emphasized the need for regular meetings between China,

Saudi Arabia, and Iran to stay updated on current developments. The speakers also identified how China's role in the region has moved from one focused on quiet diplomacy to increasing its diplomatic footprint and strategy. While the GCC is paying close attention to China's emerging role, it is also expecting China to use its current ties with countries such as Iran to support their security initiatives to decrease military activities and escalation. For this, it was mentioned from the Chinese speakers that China will require greater cooperation from the GCC side as well.

Against the backdrop of the current crisis in Gaza, the webinar discussed China's support for a global summit on the Arab-Israeli conflict. The discussion highlighted the need for China to continue supporting ceasefire agreements in which Beijing can coordinate with both sides to achieve a peaceful resolution.

There was a consistent argument that expectations on China's role in the region should not be raised too high, and that the development between the two regions should be based on a complementary relationship that can be explored in various ways, such as economic and security cooperation. Overall, there was an emphasis on the importance of dialogue, understanding, and coordination between China and the Gulf countries. It was suggested that more exchanges are needed to bridge perceptions, enhance mutual trust, and address shared interests. Nevertheless, given the strategic calculation, the webinar stressed how the Gulf states should be clear about what role they perceive China to play in regional dynamics and through what creative and innovative ways China can position itself in the region.

The webinar highlighted the increasing momentum in GCC-China economic ties and the potential for further collaboration in various sectors, including high-tech, digital technologies and biotechnology. Already, Saudi Arabia became China's number one foreign investor in 2023.

Speakers proposed that China should match the expectations of the Gulf countries and create a cooperative environment for sustainable hightech economic cooperation. In the last year, it was stated that more than 1,000 business delegations visited Saudi Arabia and the UAE, and various Chinese companies built giant infrastructure projects in Gulf states, from clean energy to railway infrastructure. Discussions on the acceleration of the ChinaGCC Free Trade Agreement (FTA) were also mentioned, and it was suggested that both sides should set a deadline for making a deal.

To overcome existing differences in ties, it was noted that it is essential to examine and understand the different Gulf states' political economy systems and why some projects in the cities succeeded and others did not, especially given the bureaucratic institutions. The webinar stressed the importance of understanding the agency of GCC states concerning the development of GCC-China cooperation and the trajectory in the future, and how to enhance more people-to-people exchange as a means to finding continued ways to develop the GCC-China relationship better and for greater understanding to take place.

Overall, the session put forward several suggestions for policy considerations:

- 1. First, the call for regular tri-lateral meetings between China, Saudi Arabia, and Iran to ensure continuous communication and deescalation efforts.
- 2. Second, holding regular seminars to delve deeper into specific topics, such as political, security, and economic aspects of GCC-China relations.
- 3. Third, consider setting up a China studies center in the Gulf to foster dialogue and understanding between the GCC and China
- 4. Fourth, accelerate developments for a deadline for the China-GCC FTA.

Red Sea Security and the Horn of Africa: Current Situation, Challenges, and Solutions

The Gulf Research Center and the Egyptian Center for Strategic Studies in Cairo organized a panel discussion titled Red Sea Security: Challenges and Solutions between Regional Responsibility and the International Community on Thursday, February 8, 2024. Speaking on behalf of the GRC were Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the GRC and Prof. Saleh M. Al-Khathlan, Senior Advisor at the GRC.

From the Egyptian Center for Strategic Studies, speakers included:

- Dr. Muhammad Mujahid Al-Zayat, Academic Advisor
- Prof. Mohamed Kamal, member of the Advisory Board and Professor of Political Science at Cairo University

The moderator of the session was Major General Muhammad Ibrahim Al-Duwairi, Deputy Director General of the Centre.

The workshop made several important assertions and policy recommendations including:

- Emphasizing the importance of Saudi/ Egyptian cooperation in securing the Red Sea
- 2. Launching a forum to discuss all issues related to the Red Sea region from security and military to economy and environment, among others
- 3. Emphasizing Iran's use of the Houthis as a pressure card to deal with the United States of America in other negotiations related to bilateral interests
- 4. Emphasizing that the United States does not want to deter Iran or the Houthis and has not taken any serious action on these two issues
- 5. There are dual dangers to the Red Sea from both the African and Asian sides, the sources of which are the Rapid Support Group and Ethiopia's penetration into Somaliland and the Houthis and Iran respectively.
- 6. Emphasizing the necessity of stopping the Gaza war, resolving the Palestinian issue by implementing the two-state solution to stem the resurgence of terrorist groups under the pretext of defending the Palestinian cause.

GCC-Nordic Relations Webinar

February 21, 2024



The Gulf Research Center (GRC) held a webinar entitled "GCC-Nordic Relations" on February 21, 2024. The speakers of the webinar were Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center; Dr. Nourah Shuaibi, Assistant Professor of Political Science at Kuwait University; Dr. Omar Al-Ubaydli, Director of Research at Derasat; Sverre Lodgaard, former Director of the Norwegian Institute of International Affairs; Fannie Agerschou-Madsen, Ph.D Candidate at the Danish Institute for International Studies; Dr. Rouzbeh Parsi, Head of the Middle East and North Africa Program at the Swedish Institute for International Studies; and Dr. Tuomo Melasuo, Emeritus Professor at the Tampere Peace Research Institute in Finland. Dr. Christian Koch, the Director of Research at the Gulf Research Center, moderated the webinar

The webinar covered three key themes:

- 1. The different perspectives from the GCC and Nordic states on current developments, both regionally and internationally.
- 2. The view of GCC and Nordic states regarding their respective relationships, including developments and challenges.
- 3. The way forward in developing cooperation between the two regions and identifying critical areas of focus.

From the Gulf perspective, there are five current priorities when it comes to the regional situation in the wider Middle East: the crisis in Gaza, Iran's use of proxies that impact regional security, the heightened escalation regarding Red Sea security, the situation in Yemen, and the economic challenges that Arab countries in the Levant and North Africa face. It was highlighted that there should be increased cooperation between the two regions to de-escalate these tensions. Outside of the immediate challenges, various areas of mutual concern still exist, including food, water, and cyber security. Diversifying economic resources is also a shared interest between the two regions.

The webinar highlighted the similarities between the institutions of the GCC and the Nordic Council and that the GCC can learn much from the Nordic model. For instance, Nordic countries, such as Norway, have shared expertise with Gulf countries, such as Saudi Arabia and Oman, regarding renewable energy and the shift away from a heavy reliance on oil and gas. It was noted that the two regions should not try to force stronger trade relations but instead should focus in parallel on technology transfer, enhancing educational ties through research institutions, and increasing people-topeople contact.

The speakers explained that while the economic relationship between two sides has been stable, the political relationship has had its ups and downs due to the difference in public perception of the Gulf countries in the Nordic states and vice versa, as well as the perception of the Nordic population and media in terms of its relationships with countries beyond the West in general. This has had implications on the development of cooperation between the two regions.

For example, due to apprehension about public sentiment toward the GCC countries, companies have hesitated to invest in or establish strategic alliances there. On a more regional level, it was highlighted that the Nordic states are very active when it comes to supporting various regional dialogues and mediation efforts, such as Sweden's mediation between Iran and Iraq during the 1980s and Norway's role between the U.S. and Iran.

Some of the suggestions put forward in the webinar include:

Manage the differences in perceptions between the two sides by increasing dialogue and communication. There is a need to enable avenues of cooperation at the midlevel, parallel to the high ministerial level of cooperation. This includes partnerships among think tanks, universities, R&D centers, business-to-business forums, governmentto-government cooperation, research collaboration, and training and exchange programs to address mutual challenges.

The two regions should make cooperation for renewable energy, the green transition, and education an essential aspect of their relationship. This includes knowledge transfer to the GCC states.

Promote tourism between the two sides and create a civil exchange program to exchange knowledge about the respective regions and improve public perspectives.

Develop student exchange programs, vocational training, summer programs, and language programs to provide both GCC and Nordic students with opportunities and experiences that will benefit them professionally and positively shape their attitudes towards the respective regions.



Visit of the State Secretary of the Republic of Germany H.E. Dr. Thomas Bagger

February 27, 2024



H.E. Dr. Thomas Bagger, State Secretary of the Federal Foreign Office of the Federal Republic of Germany, visited the Gulf Research Center (GRC) office in Riyadh, along with his accompanying delegation and H.E. Michael Kindsgrab, Ambassador of Germany to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. The meeting was held with senior experts and intellectuals from Saudi Arabia, and discussed the ongoing regional developments and ways

to understand both German and Saudi foreign policy. In terms of regional security, the discussions looked at how Europe can lead the way in assisting in de-escalation efforts in the Middle East. Overall, the roundtable underwent fruitful discussions for both sides to understand the foreign policies of Berlin and Riyadh, especially given the current regional developments.

The Crisis in Gaza and the Challenge of Regional Order in the Middle East

March 13, 2024



The Gulf Research Center (GRC) held a webinar on March 13, 2024, entitled 'The Crisis in Gaza and the Challenge of Regional Order in the Middle East.' The event examined what steps Europe and the GCC states can take to both de-escalate the current crisis as well as pave the way for a medium- to long-term political solution. H.E. Ambassador Jorge Hevia, Spanish Ambassador to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, provided initial welcoming remarks. The speakers of the session included H.E. Dr. Abdel Aziz Hamad Aluwaisheq, Assistant Secretary General for Political Affairs and Negotiations of the Cooperation Council for the Arab States of the Gulf; Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center; Ambassador Senén Florensa, Executive President of the IEMed -European Institute of the Mediterranean; Dr. Pol Morillas, Director of the Barcelona Centre for International Affairs (CIDOB); Dr. Maria Luisa Fantappiè, Head of the Mediterranean, Middle East and Africa Programme at the Istituto Affari Internazionali (IAI); Cian FitzGerald, Researcher at the Institute of International and European Affairs; and Professor Saleh Al-Khathlan, Senior Advisor of the Gulf Research Center. Dr. Christian Koch, Director of Research at the GRC, moderated the session.

Despite no international consensus on the actions needed for an immediate ceasefire, speakers argued that there is an urgent need to alleviate the humanitarian crisis and ensure compliance with international humanitarian law. In this domain, Europe's role in war-ending diplomatic efforts was seen as essential, also in terms of restoring some of Europe's relevance as a geopolitical actor. During the webinar, several suggestions were made including pushing for a United Nations Security Council resolution recognizing Palestinian statehood, addressing Israeli settler violence in the West Bank with sanctions, and engaging other countries outside

the West in the move towards Palestinian recognition. Emphasis was given to how Europe and the GCC can coordinate their efforts to create a broader strategic vision, for example, through an international peace conference. The speakers expressed cautious optimism that such collective efforts involving the GCC and EU could play a constructive role in moving current discussions forward.

From a GCC perspective, it was underlined that a ceasefire should be immediate and sustainable, and that the war cannot be allowed to continue under any pretext, given the extreme conditions the people in Gaza are living in. Key to determining how Gaza should be governed in the future as well as Israeli-Palestinian negotiation, is that this must be decided by the Palestinians themselves and that the international community should support whatever decision is reached within the context of Palestinian national unity. For the GCC, the Palestinian Authority is seen as the legitimate representatives of the Palestinians.

In addition, the Arab Peace Initiative is seen as a platform to explore ways to revive the peace process. Challenges preventing progress being made in a possible political process include the position of Prime Minister Netanyahu's government which opposes the two-state solution, and paradoxically, the government of the Islamic Republic of Iran and its associated rejectionist front. Taken together, this holds regional repercussions and has implications for the broader Middle East region. The attacks on international shipping and the efforts by the Houthi militias have already disrupted the peace process in Yemen, for example.

Another challenge highlighted was the different positions on the crisis of individual EU member states. It was noted that after seven months of conflict, the direct effects of it on Europe have become visible, illustrated by the growing social polarization within European society. Overall,

one of the significant shortcomings highlighted on the European side was that instead of addressing the overall conflict, Europe has been focusing on different side effects of the conflict, such as the security of the Red Sea and the tension and political spillover in Lebanon. It was argued that it would be better if Europe would take a broader strategic approach to ending the conflict.

Overall, the session put forward several suggestions for policy considerations:

- The crisis in Gaza is an opportunity for Europe to restore some of its geopolitical relevance by focusing on ending the war in Gaza and promoting stability in the region.
- The idea of an International Peace Conference can be advanced with European countries such as Spain advancing this concept.
- The European Union should work with the GCC states to build alliances in the region that advocate support for a two-state solution as the only viable political solution.
- International support for a legitimate Palestinian Authority in Gaza is required as the PA cannot be discredited further. This includes involvement of the EU in the political process of building the Palestinian state.
- Putting pressure on the U.S. to stop vetoing UN Security Council resolutions, realigning the role of the P5 to help reach a political solution, and using all levers within the UN multilateral system should be considered.
- Research centers from the EU and the GCC should come together and produce a joint publication(s) on the strategic view of the situation that can then be presented to officials on both sides.

GCC-Latin America Ambassador Roundtable Meeting

May 5, 2024



The Gulf Research Center (GRC) organized a roundtable discussion titled 'Developing GCC-Latin America Relations' on Sunday, May 5, 2024, at the GRC office in Riyadh. The meeting, moderated by Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the GRC, convened esteemed Iberoamerican ambassadors residing in Riyadh, along with experts and academics from the GCC.

Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the GRC, delivered the opening address, underscoring the significance of the Latin American region, its demographic weight, with 8% of the global population, and the substantial growth in trade between the GCC and Latin America, which surged from \$20 billion in 2020 to nearly \$32 billion by 2022. Dr. Sager also touched upon pivotal issues such as the Gaza crisis and diplomatic relations with Iran.

Following Dr. Sager's opening remarks, the discussion began with an emphasis on the evolving synergy between two regions frequently in the international spotlight, drawing parallels with the Palestine situation.

The historical collaboration dating back to the 1950s was underscored, presenting compelling statistics: the GCC's combined GDP totaling \$2.2 trillion compared to Latin America's \$5.5 trillion, despite the GCC comprising only six nations. At the same time, Latin America consists of over 30 countries. The significance of addressing the Gaza and Palestine issue was highlighted by the per capita GDP disparity and the vast potential for trade cooperation, echoing the sentiment, "If there is no prosperity, there is no peace," drawing from Latin America's historical experiences. The imperative of fostering peace and prosperity was emphasized, drawing upon shared experiences and aspirations, particularly in light of the Gulf's proactive stance in defusing conflict escalation

Dr. Saleh Al Khathlan, Senior Advisor at the GRC, highlighted two key points during the discussion. First, Saudi Arabia's proactive diplomatic engagement regarding the Gaza conflict emphasizes the Kingdom's longstanding commitment dating back 75 years. Saudi Arabia's enduring responsibility towards Arab issues was noted, namely the recent impetus provided by the success of Vision 2030. Driven by the understanding that stability is foundational for prosperity and peace, Saudi Arabia actively engages in regional and international efforts to resolve the conflict.

Second, Saudi Arabia's involvement in the Collective South initiative, which aims to amplify the voice of Southern nations in shaping the global agenda, was outlined. Efforts to promote cooperative relations over competition within the Collective South framework were also highlighted. Additionally, Saudi Arabia's advocacy for middle-power diplomacy, including engagement countries in Latin America, to foster a more multipolar international system was brought into the discussion.

Dr. Koch, Director of Research at the Gulf Research Center introduced two main objectives that have guided much of the Center's work since its inception. Firstly, to

provide a regional perspective from within the region itself. While there is a great deal of discussion on the Middle East and, in particular the Gulf, at the think tank level, most of this discourse takes place around the globe, with little input from within the region. The Center's aim is to foster a better understanding by presenting a regional perspective. Secondly, they strive to fill gaps in research. The GCC-Latin America Research Program is a clear example of this, as it is one of many areas that could be studied more thoroughly. It was also mentioned that establishing better relations with younger scholars from Latin America and linking them with the Saudi research staff of the GRC should be encouraged.

The discussion went on to address the big challenge that is bringing together the two regions, who being on different sides of the world, are faced with significant connectivity challenges.. The disconnect leads to issues of perception vs reality with regard to the opportunities that exist between them. It was emphasized that distance should not take away from the vast possibilities and resources available for the two sides to share in every field, particularly in trade and investment.

The discussion led to an understanding that a viable and realistic action plan has to be established to connect the two regions and that a summit between the GCC and Latin America will be an excellent opportunity to identify common interests. The participants highlighted the importance of mutual understanding and visits by high-ranking officials to foster stronger ties between Argentina and Saudi Arabia and diplomatic relations on trade, connectivity, and cultural ties.

The conversation also covered the challenges and potential areas of cooperation, including defense, environment, climate change, and geopolitical technology. The discussion also highlighted the potential for increased collaboration between Saudi Arabia and Mexico, with a proposal made for a joint public policy report.

The meeting concluded by acknowledging the need to strengthen diplomatic ties, deepen cultural understanding, and enhance bilateral and multilateral cooperation. This approach aims to address shared challenges and take advantage of mutual opportunities. The final proposal was a new initiative—a GCC-LATAM summit, which could serve as a platform for further dialogue and collaboration, ultimately contributing to strengthening relationships between the regions.

GCC-Central Asia Ambassador Roundtable Meeting

May 8, 2024



The Gulf Research Center's (GRC) GCC-Central Asia Research Program organized a GCC-Central Asia roundtable meeting in its office in Riyadh on May 8, 2024, in which it gathered ambassadors of the Central Asia region, including H.E. Ambassador Akram Karimi Muhammadar, Ambassador of the Republic of Tajikistan; H.E. Ambassador **Ulukbek Maripov**, Ambassador of Kyrgyzstan; H.E. Ambassador Madiyar Menilbekov, Ambassador of the Republic of Kazakhstan; H.E. Ambassador Shahin Abdullayev, Ambassador of the Republic of Azerbaijan, and Mr. Bakhrom Sharipov, Counselor of the Embassy of the Republic of Uzbekistan. Experts from the West Asia department at the Foreign Ministry and the Saudi business community also participated in the meeting. Prof. Dr. Saleh Al-Khathlan, Senior Advisor of the GRC, and Dr. Christian Koch, Director of Research at the GRC, moderated the meeting.

The roundtable meeting fostered a platform for robust dialogue and collaboration. Key outcomes included identifying concrete points of cooperation, notably the organization of forums, webinars, and joint studies between think tanks in the two regions to explore ways to enhance relations in all fields. The meeting focused on the current relations and developments between the GCC countries and Central Asia in coordination with the first GCC-Central Asia Summit held in Saudi Arabia in August 2023. The meeting preceded the first GCC-Central Asia Investment Forum, which was held in Riyadh on May 29, 2024, and aimed to explore economic and investment opportunities across various sectors such as renewable energy, petrochemicals, agriculture, food security, industry, healthcare, tourism, logistics services, infrastructure, technology, and digitalization.

Participants in the meeting stressed that the investment forum will bring about a quantum leap in relations between the GCC and Central Asia, representing two regional blocs whose presence is growing in the international arena. The participants noted the growing development in all aspects of cooperation between the GCC and Central Asian countries. They confirmed the existence of opportunities to enhance relations from the level of collaboration to the level of a strategic partnership, which is also affirmed by the 2023-2027 Joint Action Plan for Strategic Dialogue and Cooperation that was adopted after the GCC-Central Asia Strategic Dialogue meeting held on September 7, 2022, in Riyadh at the foreign ministerial level. This entails strengthening partnerships in new horizons, including political and security dialogue, economic investment and cooperation, enhancing communication between people, and sharing best practices and knowledge across all domains, including media, sports, tourism, youth affairs, culture, education, and tourism

Economic and trade relations have been at the forefront of GCC-CIS ties. The participants emphasized the priority of cooperation in the economic fields, including energy, logistics services, food security, and investment, and the need to deepen people-to-people relations increase mutual understanding. The participants affirmed that both regions want to enhance trade exchanges and investment flows. From the Central Asian side, the ambassadors stressed that their governments prioritize economic cooperation through energy, especially renewable energy, in their expanding bilateral ties with the GCC countries, who have expressed a particular interest in investing in the Central Asian region's energy sector.

On the geostrategic level, the participants also mentioned the ways in which the Central Asian countries have been affected by the developments in Afghanistan and the Ukraine crisis. In light of current geopolitical and geoeconomic issues, Central Asian countries are attempting to establish more avenues of collaboration. Against this backdrop, the issue of security, including cybersecurity, was mentioned as an essential point of cooperation, given that most Central Asian countries are landlocked, bordering areas of Russia and Iran. A particular challenge that was mentioned in the meeting which both regions are facing, is the fact that the current global geopolitical contestations have strengthened terror organizations and triggered the emergence of affiliates in Eurasia and the Middle East. The determination to support regional and international efforts to combat terrorism and extremism and their funding sources is, therefore, one of the high priorities for both regions. It is also mentioned in the joint statement from the summit meeting.

Overall, the roundtable meeting paved the way for strengthened partnerships through networking opportunities, facilitating mutual understanding. Through the GRC's GCC-Central Asia Research Program, we aim to provide a platform for discussion and collaboration to reflect the steady growth in the relationship between GCC and C5+1, particularly during the last few years, and to benefit from the tremendous potential that these two regions have.



Maintaining Convergence in EU-GCC Energy Ties

May 23, 2024



The Gulf Research Center (GRC) held a webinar entitled 'Maintaining Convergence in EU-GCC Energy Ties' on May 23, 2024. The speakers of the webinar were H.E. Dr. Majid AlMoneef, Chairman of the Association for Energy Economics, and Prof. Giacomo Luciani, Master in International Energy Transitions at Sciences Po Paris. Dr. Christian Koch, Director of Research at the GRC, moderated the session.

Sustainable energy security is a core focal area in the EU's Strategic Partnership document towards the Gulf region put forth in 2022. The EU-GCC policy document emphasizes the importance of partnership for a green transition and sustainable energy security, outlining the need for strategic engagement, speeding up the green transition, and meeting climate-related commitments. The document further provides some policy recommendations including setting up an EU-GCC energy and climate expert group, annual ministerial meetings on energy and climate issues, engagement on sustainable finance, and facilities for expertise on circular economies.

It was noted at the outset of the webinar that the energy scene has changed dramatically since the GCC and the EU first signed their cooperation agreement in 1988. More recently, the Russian invasion of Ukraine has heightened Europe's focus on the Gulf for energy matters. leading to an effort to increase cooperation with the region. While one sees projects being implemented at the bi-lateral level, the followthrough on agreements at the GCC-EU level remains slow, with the free trade negotiations being the primary example. In terms of outlook, the suggestion put forward was one of a continued transition on many different levels and one that is likely to be more bumpy and unstable than smooth and steady.

The webinar discussions highlighted the need for cooperation between the EU and the GCC in many different areas including sustainable energy security and the potential of hydrogen and carbon capture and sequestration (CCUS) technologies. Both speakers emphasized the importance of realistic and flexible approaches to climate commitments and the necessity for technical dialogue and integrated value chain projects to foster EU-GCC collaboration. Regarding technical cooperation on the hydrogen economy, the webinar highlighted how technical cooperation on desalination, infrastructure for hydrogen, and shipping and handling standards are areas for potential EU-GCC collaboration. Regarding the Gulf region, the GCC is investing in renewables for green hydrogen production and has the potential for blue hydrogen production with CCUS technology. Opportunities within the mineral sector, especially in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, were also mentioned given the EU's concern over critical raw materials. In addition, Europe's revaluation of CCUS and nuclear energy as potential components of reducing emissions has recently opened up areas for renewed cooperation.

The webinar also examined divergences in energy strategies. While Europe and the Gulf region have clearly stated commitments to net zero and emission reduction targets, they disagree on the exact path for best achieving these goals. For example, the GCC has advocated for a Circular Carbon Economy (CCE) as an alternative metric for measuring emissions. The GCC's approach to nuclear energy also differs from Europe's, with Saudi Arabia and the UAE considering atomic power generation while some European countries have moved into the phasing out of nuclear energy. More importantly, there are deep concerns inside the GCC regarding the EU's Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM) and its impact on GCC industries with the GCC seeing the CBAM as discriminatory and potentially inviting trade wars. The CBAM is therefore seen as the primary policy that must be re-evaluated by the EU.

- 1. First, a call for Europe to remain a partner of choice for the GCC by reevaluating policies like CBAM and engaging in cooperative discussions on critical issues.
- 2. Second, more investment in mining and a cooperative approach to developing necessary resources are needed.
- 3. Third, it is essential to set realistic targets for net zero emissions and be flexible in revising them. What is important in the end is to look at outcomes and deal with the realities rather than quickly imposing solutions.

GCC Ambassadors Luncheon Meeting

May 30, 2024



Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center (GRC), and Dr. Christian Koch, Director of the Gulf Research Center Foundation Brussel's office and Director of Research at the GRC, organized a luncheon for the GCC ambassadors and representatives of the GCC embassies in Brussels on May 30, 2024. Those in attendance were H.E. Khalid Ibrahim Mohammed Al-Jindan, Ambassador of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia; H.E. Khalid Fahad Al-Hajri, Ambassador of the State of Qatar; H.E. Abdulla Faisal Jabur Al-Doseri, Ambassador of the Kingdom of Bahrain; H.E. Nawaf N. Alenezi, Ambassador of the State of Kuwait; H.E. Haifa Al-Jadea, Ambassador of the Mission of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia to the European Union; H.E. Mohamed Al-Sahlawi, Ambassador of the United Arab Emirates; and Mr. Humaid Almansoori, Head of Parliamentary Affairs, Embassy of the United Arab Emirates.

During the luncheon, the participants discussed ways to enhance cooperation between the Gulf and Europe and ways the soon-to-open Gulf Research Center Foundation (GRCF) office in Brussels can provide the space to develop and deepen the relationship between both sides by building networks across all official and unofficial channels, thus broadening relations between the Gulf and Europe. This is important as the Gulf states need a voice in Europe to ensure their interests are heard and understood.



Central Asia Ambassador's Roundtable Meeting

October 7, 2024

The Gulf Research Center (GRC) GCC-Central Asia Research Program, in partnership with H.E. Ambassador Madiyar Menilbekov, Ambassador of the Republic of Kazakhstan to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, organized a roundtable meeting at the GRC office in Riyadh on October 7, 2024, in light of celebrating the 30th anniversary of diplomatic relations between Saudi Arabia and Kazakhstan.





This meeting gathered ambassadors of the Central Asia region, including H.E. Ambassador Akram Karimi Muhammadar, Ambassador of the Republic of Tajikistan, H.E. Ambassador Ulukbek Maripov, Ambassador of Kyrgyzstan, H.E. Ambassador Shahin Abdullayev, Ambassador of the Republic of Azerbaijan, and H.E. Ambassador Nodirjon Turgunov, Ambassador of the Republic of Uzbekistan. Experts from the Saudi business community also participated in the meeting. The meeting focused on the current relations and developments in cooperation between Kazakhstan and Saudi Arabia, in addition to the overall relations of the Kingdom with the other countries of Central Asia. The participants noted the growing development in all aspects of cooperation between the GCC and Central Asian countries including political and security dialogue, economic and investment cooperation, enhancing communication

between people, and sharing best practices and knowledge across all domains, including media, sports, tourism, youth affairs, culture, education, and tourism.

Economic and trade relations have been at the forefront of GCC and Central Asia ties. The participants emphasized the priority of cooperation in the economic fields, including logistics services, infrastructure, investment **projects**, and the need to deepen people-to-people relations to increase mutual understanding. The participants affirmed that both regions want to enhance trade exchanges and investment flows. From the Central Asian side, the ambassadors stressed that their governments prioritize economic cooperation through energy, especially renewable energy, in their expanding bilateral ties with the GCC countries, who have expressed a particular interest in investing in the Central Asian region's energy sector.



The roundtable also explored the potential for establishing a **joint fund** between the Gulf and Central Asia, emphasizing how such a mechanism could drive future economic and investment cooperation. Both regions expressed interest in enhancing Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) between Central Asian and Saudi bank chambers, as well as with other GCC states' government chambers. **Expanding think tank institutional relations** between the two regions was also highlighted as a critical way to foster deeper collaboration and policy dialogue.

Both regions discussed the importance of organizing business delegations to facilitate direct engagement and explore joint ventures, particularly in sectors of mutual interest. Collaborative projects focusing on neighboring regions were also highlighted as a way to promote regional stability and shared growth. Additionally, both sides saw significant potential in launching joint natural resource projects that leverage the wealth of resources from Central Asia and the Gulf states, including energy, minerals, and agricultural assets, to benefit both regions economically.

Roundtable on EU-GCC Relations Supported by the European Union



October 10, 2024

On October 10, 2024, the Gulf Research Center Foundation Brussels convened a roundtable discussion on EU-GCC relations ahead of the inaugural EU-GCC Summit at the heads of state level on October 16 in Brussels and in line with the official opening of the Gulf Research Center Foundation Brussels office (GRCF). The roundtable brought together stakeholders from both regions to discuss pressing issues and identify areas of mutual interest. The objectives of the meeting included:

- Deepening the understanding and analysis of current political and security issues and their respective dynamics.
- Exploring sustainable economic and energy collaborations and opportunities within the framework of agreed climate targets and green transition commitments.
- Identifying mechanisms to enhance social and people-to-people connections.



Panel Session:

The first panel on 'The Middle East Regional Environment from a Gulf and European: Current Drivers, Assessments and Outlooks' had input from Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the GRC, Helene Le Gal, Managing Director of the Middle East Department of the European External Action Service, and Sheikha Najla AlQassimi, Associate Researcher of the Global Affairs Department of the Dubai Public Policy Research Institute (b'huth).



Panel Session 1

This panel focused on the geopolitical landscape and how it is characterized by trends of uncertainty, normalization of force, increased fragmentation and polarization, and an acceleration of global transition. It was emphasized that it is more important than ever to focus on reconstructing the human element in future action plans on post-conflict building and regional cooperation. It was further mentioned that discussions on any potential developments in the Saudi-Iran

relationship should be conducted and examined through four pillars: different political systems, ideology, oil policy, and regional security.

The second panel of the GCC-EU Relations workshop was focused on "Enhancing Sustainable Economic and Energy Partnerships between the GCC and EU in Green Transition Context" brought into light the pessimism on both sides regarding the prospect of a EU-GCC FTA, raising questions on the bilateral agreements as an alternative.



Panel Session 2

The speakers included Léon Delvaux, Principal Advisor, DG Trade from the European Commission, Dr. John Sfakianakis, Chief Economist at the GRC, Haitze Siemers, Senior Advisor, DG Energy at the European Commission, and Faris Al-Sulayman, Founder of Haala Energy, and Non-Resident Scholar at the Middle East Institute.

It was highlighted that more focus should be put on exploring opportunities towards a roadmap for comprehensive trade agreements with more bold, ambitious opportunities. In addition, better and more coordinated decarbonization efforts, structured Sovereign Wealth and EU Investment Funds, and trilateral partnerships for example with Africa should be pursued.

The third and final session, "Strengthening Social & People-to-People Ties with a Focus on Human Rights- Women's Empowerment and Youth Engagement" highlighted the critical importance of a paradigm shift to effectively address the people-to-people exchange.

The speakers of this panel were Felix Fehling, Cooperation Officer, DG for International Partnerships (INTPA), Hanaa AlMoaibed, Associate Fellow, Middle East and North Africa Programme at Chatham House, and Khalid Al-Huraibi, Founder and Managing Director at Impact Incorporated.



Panel Session 3

The discussion highlighted that while journeys are different and the end goals are not necessarily the same, mutual respect and cooperation should still be in place. There was a call to think beyond the EU perception on women and youth needs in the GCC to actually build collaborative initiatives based on first-hand, context-specific notions of these needs. This could come about by marking a systematic and structural shift from previous conversations and strategies to focus on codesigned and co-created projects based on ecosystem and strategic mapping.

German - Saudi Roundtable Meeting Visit of MP Thomas Röwekamp, Member of the German Parliament

October 27, 2024





On October 27, 2024, the Gulf Research Center (GRC) hosted a roundtable discussion at its Riyadh office, coinciding with the visit of MP Thomas Röwekamp, a distinguished Member of the German Parliament. The event, organized in collaboration with the Konrad Adenauer Foundation, aimed to foster dialogue and deepen mutual understanding between Germany and Saudi Arabia regarding their shared commitment to promoting stability in the Middle East.

The session provided a valuable platform for Gulf and German policy experts and researchers to explore potential avenues for collaboration across various sectors, including security, economic development, and cultural exchange. Discussions emphasized the importance of a coordinated approach to address regional challenges such as conflict resolution, economic diversification, and sustainable development. Both sides highlighted their commitment to strengthening diplomatic ties and working together on initiatives that would positively impact regional peace and stability.

The roundtable underscored the foundation of Gulf-German relations and identified specific areas where the two nations could leverage their unique strengths to contribute to a more secure and prosperous Middle East.





GCC-Korea Cooperation Seminar





Organized by the Gulf Research Center (GRC) and the Embassy of the Republic of Korea to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia

November 12, 2024

The Embassy of the Republic of Korea to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia and the Gulf Research Center (GRC) hosted the first 'Korea-GCC Cooperation Seminar' in Riyadh, marking a significant step toward strengthening ties between Korea and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries. This seminar gathered experts, policy officials, and academics from both regions, creating a platform to discuss current dynamics and potential avenues for deeper collaboration in key areas such as energy, security, defense, and economic growth. Discussions highlighted shared priorities, particularly developing a strategic partnership that includes enhanced cooperation in security and defense. With growing geopolitical complexities in the region, delegates acknowledged the importance of forging robust security alliances and exploring defense collaborations that address shared challenges and support regional stability. Energy cooperation also took center stage, with dialogue around renewable energy, nuclear energy, and Korea's advancements in Small Modular Reactors (SMRs). The event also provided a space to discuss other regional issues, such as economic diversification and sustainable development goals.



Delegates from the Gulf Cooperation Council, the Saudi Ministry of Economy and Planning, the Ministry of Energy, the Ministry of Commerce, the Ministry of **Investment**, the **Ministry of Communications** and Information Technology, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and Gulf states embassies in Riyadh attended the seminar. Representatives from the Shura Council, Riyadh Chamber of Commerce, Saudi Nuclear Energy Holding Company, Princess Nourah University, and members of the Saudi-Korean Parliamentary Friendship Committee also participated. From the Korean side, delegates from KOTRA Riyadh, the Commercial Section of the Embassy of the Republic of Korea, KIND -Korea-KSA Infrastructure Cooperation Center, and KOSME Korean SMEs and Startups Agency attended.

This multi-stakeholder presence underscored the seminar's role as a bridge between Korea and the Gulf states, fostering open dialogue and encouraging practical solutions to shared challenges. Through these discussions, both sides explored how they might deepen their partnerships to address global and regional issues, emphasizing the importance of economic resilience, energy security, and environmental sustainability as foundational elements of their cooperation.

Choi Byung-Hyuk, Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, and Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center (GRC), opened the session with welcoming remarks that underscored the strategic importance of Korea-GCC relations. Ambassador Choi reaffirmed Korea's commitment to fostering a stable and prosperous relationship with the Gulf states. Dr. Abdulaziz Sager emphasized the role of collaborative engagement in deepening mutual understanding and driving actionable policy frameworks, setting the stage for an era of closer cooperation on multiple fronts. Both sides expressed confidence that the seminar would lay the groundwork for expanded economic, political, and social partnerships between Korea and the GCC, particularly security, defense. and sustainable development.

Session 1:

Korea-GCC Relations: Navigating Current Dynamics and Future Opportunities

The first session of the Korea-GCC Cooperation Seminar highlighted the Republic of Korea's economic growth trajectory and examined the current structure of GCC-Korea trade relations. where oil comprises a substantial 92% of GCC exports to Korea. Despite an impressive trade volume of \$50 billion, participants recognized that this figure falls short of the vast economic potential between the two regions, pointing to untapped opportunities in non-oil sectors. The session underscored the need for diversification, suggesting that the Free Trade Agreement (FTA) between Korea and the GCC could be transformative. Such an agreement would not only bolster trade volume but could also promote more sustainable economic growth by fostering cross-border investments and shifting focus from merely trade in goods to creating long-term investment partnerships. By advancing the FTA, both sides could leverage complementary strengths to achieve higher levels of innovation, especially in technology, manufacturing, and services, creating new economic synergies.



Panel Session 1: Korea-GCC Relations: Navigating Current Dynamics and Future Opportunities

The seminar also addressed Korea's emerging role as a "middle power" with significant influence in regional security matters. Recognizing Korea's capabilities in this regard, participants discussed the potential for closer collaboration in humanitarian aid, emergency response, and political coordination to promote stability in the Gulf region. There were calls for strengthening military and defense ties, which could serve the dual purpose of supporting local defense industries and enhancing the collective security framework within the Gulf. This cooperation could involve knowledge exchange, joint training exercises, and potentially co-developing defense technology tailored to regional needs. Participants agreed that sustained political engagement is essential to provide strategic depth and resilience to the Korea-GCC partnership. The session further emphasized people-topeople diplomacy, with recommendations to encourage tourism from Korea to GCC states as a means of building cultural understanding and reinforcing diplomatic relations.

The longstanding and rapidly evolving Korea-GCC relationship was highlighted as having substantial multi-sector strategic potential, particularly as both sides look to align government policies with private-sector initiatives. Korea's experience in technologydriven sectors and its competitive advantages in innovation and manufacturing make it a valuable partner for GCC countries seeking to diversify their economies beyond oil. Within the KSA/UAE-Korea trade corridor, there was a clear consensus on the importance of maximizing economic opportunities, especially in emerging sectors such as clean energy, digital infrastructure, and green technology. The session highlighted that by actively pursuing joint ventures and public-private partnerships, Korea and the GCC could not only enhance economic ties but also contribute to a more sustainable and diversified future for both regions.

Session 2:

Korean Energy Cooperation

The discussion in the second session delved deeply into the promising collaboration between Korea and Saudi Arabia in the field of Small Modular Reactors (SMRs), an area poised for strategic impact. Panelists noted that SMRs, due to their compact size, scalability, and flexibility, are uniquely well-suited for environments like Saudi Arabia, where energy demands are rising, and sustainability is a national priority. Unlike traditional large reactors, SMRs can be deployed more quickly, cost-effectively, and with fewer resource requirements, making them an ideal solution for diversifying the Kingdom's energy landscape.

There was a strong consensus that by focusing on joint development and implementation of SMR technology, both Korea and Saudi Arabia could not only meet immediate energy needs but also contribute to long-term energy security in the region. Participants highlighted the potential to leverage Saudi Arabia's vast landscape and resource capacity with Korea's advanced technological expertise to create high-impact SMR projects that could set a new standard for nuclear energy collaboration in the Middle East.



Panel Session 2: Korean Energy Cooperation

The session also highlighted the evolution of Korea-Saudi Arabia cooperation. While historically productive, the relationship has often been transactional, focused on specific projects rather than long-term strategic objectives. Moving forward, panelists underscored the importance of elevating this partnership from a transactional to a transformative alliance, focusing on sustainable economic growth as a shared priority.

The panelists acknowledged that by aligning their strategies and investments, both nations could foster an environment conducive to innovation, resilience, and shared growth. They proposed establishing joint research centers and pilot projects to test and refine SMR technology specifically for the environmental conditions of the Middle East. The session concluded with a strong call for Korea and Gulf states to institutionalize their partnership, creating a framework that would facilitate deeper strategic cooperation in SMRs and beyond, ultimately positioning the two nations as leading players in sustainable nuclear energy.

Korea-GCC Dialogue on Regional Issues

The third and final session addressed the profound shifts in U.S. policies and the complex geopolitical landscape in Northeast Asia, with a concentrated focus on three major issues: the ongoing instability on the Korean Peninsula, rising regional tensions and threats in the Middle East, and the pressing need for more robust strategic alignment among allied and partner nations. Experts noted that the evolving security dynamics in Northeast Asia have significant implications for both Korea and Gulf nations, with instability on the Korean Peninsula potentially affecting regional stability and security globally. Broader tensions with influential players in Asia also present challenges that require both proactive and collaborative approaches to ensure regional resilience. As the Gulf states continue on their path towards greater diversification and security autonomy, they are increasingly open to strategic partnerships that reinforce their stability and address shared security threats, making Korea a valuable partner.



Panel Session 3: Korea-GCC Dialogue on Regional Issues

A key theme in the session was the need to enhance and conduct joint maritime security exercises to address common threats, especially as both Korea and the Gulf nations rely heavily on safe maritime routes for trade and energy transport. By developing joint response protocols, both sides can ensure they are prepared to counteract potential disruptions caused by piracy, territorial disputes, or regional conflicts that could impact maritime security.

Furthermore, participants emphasized the critical role of multilateral forums, such as the United Nations and other international bodies, as avenues for supporting each other's regional goals and interests. Strengthening defense industry collaboration was seen as mutually beneficial, allowing both Korea and Gulf nations to build resilience through shared defense technologies, joint manufacturing initiatives, and co-investment in defense R&D. This collaboration would provide Korea with a foothold in the Gulf's expanding defense market, while Gulf states would benefit from Korea's advanced technology and experience in areas like missile defense, cybersecurity, and military logistics.

The Gulf countries, driven by a desire for greater independence and a balanced international stance, are moving towards policies that enhance their self-reliance and neutrality. This approach is reflected in their foreign relations strategy, which increasingly seeks balanced partnerships that do not rely solely on traditional Western alliances.

Recognizing that maritime security is a pressing global issue—with Korea also deeply impacted by its maritime vulnerabilities—participants discussed the importance of moving beyond conventional trade arrangements to establish genuine strategic partnerships. This involves setting clear partnership objectives, including security, energy sustainability, and defense industry synergies, and defining mechanisms and channels to achieve these objectives. Participants agreed that establishing regular high-level dialogues, creating a framework for defense cooperation, and instituting working groups focused on specific security and defense areas would be instrumental in advancing Korea-Gulf cooperation, ultimately contributing to greater stability and prosperity in both regions.

Key Outcomes and Policy Recommendations

Establishing a Strategic Framework Beyond Traditional Trade:

- This seminar underscored the importance of moving beyond traditional, transactional trade relations between Korea and the GCC, focusing instead on forming strategic partnerships with long-term impact. To achieve this, it was recommended to clearly define what constitutes a "strategic partnership" between these regions.
- Establishing mechanisms and channels—
 such as dedicated liaison offices, regular
 policy dialogues, and bilateral councils—
 was highlighted as essential to ensure
 effective and sustained cooperation. By
 articulating shared objectives, Korea and the
 GCC can develop more cohesive policies
 that align their goals in areas like security,
 technology, and sustainable development.



Initiating Early Cooperation Ahead of the Free Trade Agreement (FTA)

- While the activation of a Korea-GCC FTA will be significant, participants noted that there is a strong foundation for initiating cooperation immediately, rather than waiting for formal ratification. It is encouraged to act now, leveraging existing platforms and agreements to launch collaborative projects, share technology, and engage in joint research.
- This proactive approach would allow both regions to build momentum, foster trust, and demonstrate the tangible benefits of their partnership, thereby smoothing the path for a more comprehensive FTA when it comes into effect.

Facilitating Informal Expert Group Visits and Task-Oriented Meetings

- A key recommendation was the creation of informal expert groups focused on priority areas such as energy, security, and advanced technology.
- These groups would comprise specialists and experts from Korea and the GCC, forming task groups to address specific challenges and opportunities. Informal, frequent exchanges between these experts—whether through visits, workshops, or virtual meetings—could help both regions identify mutual goals and develop actionable insights without the formality of state-level negotiations. This flexible approach would facilitate agile responses to emerging issues and promote innovative problem-solving.

Enhancing Engagement with the Private Sector

- Both Korean and GCC participants emphasized the critical role of the private sector in driving economic growth and innovation.
- There was broad consensus on the need for structured engagement with private enterprises from both regions. It was recommended that future cooperation frameworks incorporate mechanisms for private-sector involvement, including public-private partnerships, investment incentives, and dedicated business councils. By fostering stronger ties between Korean and GCC businesses, the two regions can accelerate knowledge transfer, leverage capital and expertise, and support entrepreneurship and job creation across diverse sectors.

Saudi-Nordic Relations Webinar

November 13, 2024



The Gulf Research Center (GRC) hosted a webinar titled "Saudi-Nordic Relations" on November 13, 2024. The panel of speakers included Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center; Prof. Saleh AlKhathlan, Senior Advisor at the Gulf Research Center; Amb. Jakob Hallgren, Ambassador and Director of the Swedish Institute of International Affairs (UI); Prof. Jakub Godzimirski, Research Professor at the Norwegian Institute of International Affairs (NUPI); Dr. John Sfakianakis, Director of Economic Research & Chief Economist at the Gulf Research Center; and Mr. Mohammed Hadi, Research Fellow at the Finnish Institute of International Affairs (FIIA). Dr. Christian

Koch, the Gulf Research Center Foundation Brussels Executive Manager and Director of Research at the Gulf Research Center, moderated the webinar.

The webinar focused on Saudi-Nordic relations, exploring developments and opportunities for collaboration. The discussion was part of a broader research program on GCC-NB8 relations. The meeting highlighted the importance of addressing regional conflicts and fostering sustainable economic and cultural partnerships. Participants expressed interest in further dialogue and collaboration to enhance mutual understanding and cooperation.

Political and Security Dimensions:

The webinar covered the current approach and efforts by the GCC states, particularly Saudi Arabia, in emphasizing the mediation differences through negotiations, diplomacy, and dialogue, which has come to the forefront through the GCC Vision for Regional Security and the recent Global Alliance for the Implementation of the Two-State Solution. Of the five Nordic countries, three have recognized the State of Palestine, including Iceland, the first Nordic country to recognize Palestine in 2011, followed by Sweden in 2014, and, most recently, Norway in 2024. The importance of Norway's position on Palestine was highlighted in the session, with the speakers arguing that the other Nordic countries should consider taking such a step as well. The speakers highlighted that finding peaceful solutions to the conflicts in the Middle East is at the top of Norway's political agenda and includes a high level of public support.

In terms of security, the speakers highlighted the importance of increasing efforts in strengthening maritime security and countering terrorism and extremism, given the expected rise following the instability in Gaza, Lebanon, and Syria. Denmark currently plays a significant role in maritime security in the region. The speakers also emphasized that Sweden and Finland both became members of NATO last year, leading to new and interesting avenues for collaboration with Saudi Arabia, especially in shared challenges such as terrorism and cybersecurity. There are also opportunities to ensure and strengthen defense collaboration.

Economic and Energy Relations:

While economic relations between Saudi Arabia and the Nordic countries exist, the speakers concurred that there is untapped potential for substantial growth. Currently, there is limited trade between the two sides, but the technology and innovation sectors present promising opportunities. The Nordic sovereign wealth funds could play a pivotal role in promoting economic growth in Saudi Arabia by initiating investments in the Kingdom, especially given the strategic Vision 2030 program that aims to diversify the economy. The speakers delved into investment strategies and the potential for joint funds. Finland, in particular, identified Saudi Arabia as the most important export destination for Finnish products in the Gulf region.

One issue discussed was that while there is an investment flow going from the Nordic countries into Saudi Arabia, there is not so much going the other way, (from Saudi Arabia to the Nordic countries). In terms of trade, in 2023, the outflow was close to one-sixth of what the Nordic countries exported to the Kingdom. As a result, and given the many projects being conducted in Saudi Arabia as part of Vision 2030, there exists much room for further enhancing economic ties related to the theme of trade and development. The innovation sector was identified as one area to focus on.

Energy also plays a crucial role in the relationship with collaboration in renewable energy and decarbonization efforts underlined. The speakers highlighted that recent years have witnessed the signing of many cooperation agreements and MoUs between Saudi Arabia and the Nordic countries on cooperation in the energy sector, seeking to increase cooperation in areas such as renewable energy, development of stable electricity systems, and various technologies and solutions to mitigate climate change such as carbon capture and sequestration.

Social and Cultural Aspects:

One common issue identified in the session was the difference in public perception of the Gulf countries in the Nordic states and vice versa, as well as the negative perception of the Nordic population and media in terms of its relationships with countries beyond the West in general. This has had implications for the development of cooperation between the two regions. In response, the webinar addressed the importance of fostering people-to-people contact and educational ties as one effort to improve mutual perceptions. Sweden was cited as an example of educational cooperation through its Nord Plus program. Promoting tourism between the regions was also mentioned, given that there is a focus on

both luxury and eco-tourism, with a projection of 800 million US dollars in revenue in the tourism sector for the GCC in 2024.

Key recommendations of the webinar included:

- All Gulf speakers emphasized the need for Denmark and Finland to follow through on the recognition of Palestine as an independent state in the UN system. This recognition is seen as a crucial step towards promoting peace and stability in the region.
- Strengthening the role of the Nordic countries in promoting safer maritime security in the Red Sea and Gulf waters, given that freedom of navigation is crucial for both sides.
- Exploring ways to further enhance cooperation between Saudi Arabia and the Nordic countries in combating terrorism and extremism. Additional efforts should also be made to increase collaboration on the humanitarian side.
- Increasing dialogue and communication to manage the differences in perceptions between the two sides. Creating a dedicated research institution or research program on the relationship was suggested to expand networks and enhance Saudi-Nordic relations.
- Saudi Arabia should be added to the list of countries that can receive investments from the Nordic sovereign wealth funds to increase economic relations.
- One of the key steps towards enhancing economic relations is the establishment of a Free Trade Agreement between the EU and the GCC. This agreement could significantly boost economic relations between Saudi Arabia and the Nordic countries, providing a structured framework for trade and investment.

GCC-MIKTA Roundtable:

Strengthening Multilateralism in the Face of Global Challenges: A MIKTA **Perspective**

November 14, 2024







The Gulf Research Center (GRC), in coordination with the Embassy of Mexico to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, which is the coordinator of MIKTA this year, organized a roundtable meeting on November 14, 2024, that brought together ambassadors from MIKTA countries (Mexico, Indonesia, South Korea, Türkiye, and Australia) to discuss their shared commitment to multilateralism in light of today's complex global challenges. As an alliance of influential middle powers from diverse regions, MIKTA represents a unique partnership with the potential to drive constructive change in international relations. The meeting marked the first meeting between the GCC and MIKTA as two blocs, emphasizing the increasing relevance of middle-power coalitions in mediating global issues, promoting economic stability, and addressing security concerns.

A Unique Middle-Power Alliance

MIKTA's composition is unique in its cross-continental span, with each country holding significant economic weight within its respective region. Despite their geographical and cultural diversity, MIKTA members share a commitment to stability, development, and good governance, operating within different regional contexts that offer a broad perspective on global challenges. The ambassadors highlighted that MIKTA's diversity is an asset, enabling it to serve as a bridge between different parts of the world and to foster inclusive, multipolar governance. Through collaborative approaches, MIKTA can provide incentives for mediation processes, thus positioning itself as a stabilizing force in international affairs.

This meeting highlights how the world is navigating an era of unprecedented complexity in international relations, marked by ongoing conflicts and a shift toward a more multipolar. unpredictable global order. In this context, the MIKTA countries-Mexico, Indonesia, South Korea, Türkiye, and Australia—have recognized the pressing need for stronger multilateral frameworks to address these challenges. With regional stability increasingly impacted by global issues, ambassadors discussed how MIKTA has emerged as a coalition advocating for a multilateral approach as the optimal solution. The shared belief among MIKTA countries is that coordinated international efforts, rather than isolated national approaches, will be essential to tackling issues of security, development, and governance that now transcend borders.



By fostering closer regional ties, MIKTA intends to build a foundation that not only supports sustainable growth but also strengthens resilience against global economic and environmental shocks. This collaborative approach further underscores MIKTA and GCC openness to exploring opportunities for collaboration, including academic and policy research, where the two blocs can work together on shared goals.

It was discussed that in the past four years, the multilateral system has been significantly challenged by regional and trade security disruptions. The COVID-19 pandemic, for example, introduced new vulnerabilities to global supply chains and trade routes, while security threats— such as Houthi attacks on maritime routes—have brought severe repercussions to regional trade and food security.

These crises have underscored the need for resilient, rules-based systems that can better withstand future shocks. While bilateral relations have strengthened in response to these challenges, the participants in the meeting echoed the need for "mini-lateral" partnerships, where smaller focused groups can address targeted issues within the larger multilateral system. Through such partnerships, plural-lateral frameworks can

provide a pragmatic response to complex challenges, ensuring that international systems are adaptable, efficient, and better equipped to protect global trade and food security.



As a collection of countries with distinct cultural and economic backgrounds, MIKTA exemplifies the potential of diverse nations to work together toward a shared goal of global peace and sustainability. Türkiye in particular, highlighted food security as a priority issue during its 2022 chairmanship of MIKTA, recognizing that this issue directly impacts global stability requires immediate, collaborative action. The Turkish delegation emphasized MIKTA's potential as a "driving force" for effective global governance in today's multipolar world. By actively engaging in issues like food security, MIKTA showcases its commitment to constructive leadership, encouraging global cooperation for a more habitable, peaceful world.

Outcomes and Recommendations

The seminar identified several key areas for potential GCC-MIKTA collaboration:

- Knowledge sharing: Establish platforms for sharing expertise on extremism, counterterrorism, and sustainable development, areas where both blocs face shared challenges.
- Bilateral and multilateral trade agreements: Explore opportunities for FTAs between GCC and individual MIKTA countries to strengthen economic ties.
- Development Initiatives: Joint training programs and academic partnerships focused on development cooperation and policy research can deepen connections and improve mutual understanding.
- "Mini-lateral" approaches: Small-scale partnerships can address specific challenges, such as food security and maritime safety, within a broader multilateral framework.
- Rules-based multilateral systems: Both GCC and MIKTA members reaffirmed their commitment to a rules-based international order, which can help build resilience in trade and security.



Saudi-European Roundtable

December 10, 2024



On December 10, 2024, the Gulf Research Center (GRC) hosted a roundtable in Riyadh on the occasion of the visit of Prof. Dr. Daniela Schwarzer. Member of the Executive Board of the Bertelsmann Foundation, and Christian Hanelt, Senior Expert on Middle East from the foundation's Europe's Future Program. The discussions focused on Gulf-Europe relations, addressing key challenges posed by the current regional escalations and exploring Europe's role in promoting stability and security in the Gulf region.

The event was attended by HE Mr. Christophe Farnaud, Ambassador of the European Union to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, and HE Mr. Michael Kindsgrab, Ambassador of Germany to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. Delegates from the Saudi Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Gulf Cooperation Council, the German-Saudi Arabian Liaison Office for Economic Affairs (GESALO), and leading Saudi experts on European affairs also participated in the discussions. The roundtable provided a platform to assess the challenges shaping European security and economic policies, particularly in the context of the EU's new leadership, the incoming U.S. administration, the ongoing Ukraine-Russia war, and the evolving global dynamics involving China and the Middle East.



The roundtable discussion covered how the European Union finds itself at a crossroads, navigating complex internal and external dynamics amidst global uncertainty. Internally, a new structure of informal coordination is emerging, although a formal transfer of competence remains elusive. Neither France nor Germany is willing to act unilaterally on major issues, preferring to consult with other EU member states. Externally, Europe faces a shifting geopolitical landscape as the U.S. gradually withdraws from certain roles, compounded by the unpredictability of U.S. policy under figures like Donald Trump. Concerns over U.S. tariffs, escalating tensions with China, and a potential push toward protectionism further strain Europe's economic growth, which is already under pressure.

In the Gulf and Middle East, the EU grapples with a gap between its ambitions and its capacity to act. Collective stances on conflicts like Syria and Gaza remain fragmented, with internal debates—such as Germany's position on Palestine—highlighting divisions. While the EU recognizes the strategic importance of closer Gulf relations, building meaningful partnerships is seen as a long-term process, challenged by economic nationalism and competing interests, particularly in the Mediterranean and North African regions. The EU acknowledges that it cannot engage with its southern neighbors solely through a lens of migration and negativity.

On the broader political stage, Europe seeks a clearer strategy regarding regional security, especially concerning Saudi Arabia's role in conflicts like Syria and Gaza. While economic and energy cooperation with the Gulf continues to grow, there is a pressing need for a unified political agenda to support these ties. The EU also faces critical questions about its engagement with Russia, requiring consensus on strategic goals postceasefire, as well as its approach to Israel-Palestine relations, where collective action is urgently needed. Ultimately, Europe's ability to address these challenges hinges on strong leadership and member states' willingness to reconcile differences and pursue a coherent strategy in both regional and global contexts.



Research Reports

In July 2024, the International Labour Organisation (ILO) published a regional report and twelve country reports (in English and Arabic) as the result of a joint project of the ILO/Regional Office for Arab States (ROAS) and the Gulf Labour Markets, Migration, and Population (GLMM) programme assessing the labour migration statistics for the 6 GCC and 6 other Arab Mashreq countries. The regional and country reports were drafted by a core team of experts of the GLMM under the auspices of the Gulf Research Centre Foundation (GCRF) in Geneva. The core team comprised: Philippe Fargues, former Robert Schuman Chair and Founding Director of the

Migration Policy Centre (MPC), European University Institute (EUI), Florence, and Scientific Director, GLMM; Nasra M. Shah, Professor of Migration and Development, Graduate Institute of Development Studies, Lahore School of Economics, and Scientific Director, GLMM; Françoise De Bel-Air, Researcher and Consultant, Senior Fellow, GLMM; and Imco Brouwer, Managing Director, GLMM. The report was prepared under the overall coordination of Ryszard Cholewinski, Senior Migration Specialist and Nader Keyrouz, former Regional Labour Statistician, ILO ROAS.

Policy Research Projects



Vision 2030 and the Socio-Economic Reform Process: The Future of Labour and Migration in Saudi Arabia

GLMM, in cooperation with the International Migration Division in the Direction for Employment, Labour and Social Affairs of the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), seeks to enhance the understanding of the Saudi labour market, migration, and population policies and their impact in the project entitled "Vision 2030 and the Socio-Economic Reform Process: The Future of Labour and Migration in Saudi Arabia." The project gathers key Saudi and international experts, to engage in discussions, to produce research reports and policy briefs, and to ensure ample dissemination of the outcomes to Saudi policymakers, researchers, economic actors, and the wider public. The first meetings of the project took place in Riyadh on 20 and 21 February 2024.





On 7 May at the GRC's Riyadh office, GLMM launched the project with the participation of:

- Mr. Badr Alsharif (economic policy expert) and Dr. Mehmet Soytas (labour economist) who are part of the eight Saudi, Saudibased, and international experts conducting the research for the project
- Saudi Ministry of Human Resources and Social Development (MHRSD)
- National Labor Observatory (NLO)
- Royal Commission for Riyadh City (RCRC)
- King Abdullah Petroleum Studies and Research Center (KAPSARC)
- UN organizations: IOM, UNHRC, UNICEF, UNODC

The Ministry of Economy and Planning (MEP), the International Labour Organisation (ILO), King Faisal Center for Research and Islamic Studies (KFCRIS), and the International Migration Division in the Direction for Employment, Labour and Social Affairs of the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) expressed interest in the project but were unable to attend the meeting.

A virtual meeting with the authors was held on 29 October.

The final meeting of the first phase/year was held on 1-2 December – for details see below.

Objectives of the project:

- Enhance understanding of the Saudi labour market, migration dynamics at all skill levels, and population policies and their impact on Saudi Arabia.
- Provide sound background information on the above, and policy advice for Saudi policymakers and economic actors, within the framework of Saudi Vision 2030.
- Foster a network of key Saudi experts, academics, and institutions, as well as international experts on the Saudi labour market, migration dynamics, and population policies and their impact.
- Create the conditions for continued research on the Saudi labour market, migration dynamics, and population policies and their impact on Saudi Arabia.







Process

A foundational element of the project is the active involvement of experts from Saudi institutions, international organizations, academia, and think tanks who exchange

knowledge and views on key issues relating to the future of labor markets and migration within the framework of Saudi Vision 2030 in an informal setting operating under the Chatham House Rules. These experts have been and will continue to be fundamental in identifying the most important topics to be researched, reviewing, and discussing draft papers, participating in public events and webinars, and using the acquired knowledge in the definition and implementation of their policies and further research.

Focus of the project

- Saudi citizens' socio-economic characteristics and their possible future trends
- Future labour needs and migration in and to Saudi Arabia
- Challenges and opportunities created by the reforms
- Transversal issue: Data for evidencebased policy making and enhanced knowledge

Phases of the project

The project is divided into 3 phases of approximately 10-12 months:

- Focus on highly skilled labour
- Focus on Saudi citizens
- Global changes in the Saudi labour market

Activities and output: Statistical data; Laws, bilateral agreements, and policy documents; Research papers; Policy briefs; Factsheets; Workshop; Outreach meeting for selected stakeholders; Outreach webinar for the wider public.



In May, GLMM agreed on a joint project with the Konrad Adenauer Stiftung (KAS) entitled "Highly Skilled Migration to the Gulf States: How Do GCC Countries Fare in the Global Competition for Talent?" The project aims to provide an indepth analysis of highly skilled migration trends and dynamics in the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) region. It examines policies, migration dynamics, and outcomes related to the attraction, recruitment and retention of highly skilled talent from Arab (Egypt, Jordan, Tunisia) and Asian (India, Pakistan, the Philippines) countries of origin to three GCC states: Qatar, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates.

Activities and output: Statistical data; Laws, bilateral agreements, and policy documents; Research papers; Policy briefs; Factsheets; Workshop; Outreach meeting for selected stakeholders; Outreach webinar for the wider public.



The project will produce a total of eight Research Reports and eight corresponding Policy Briefs. The first drafts were submitted at the end of September. Revised (final) drafts were submitted at the end of October.

Research Project Results Meeting

What is the future of labour and migration in Saudi Arabia and the Gulf states? How can the region better attract and retain foreign talents to meet their labour force needs, especially within the context of their various economic transformation agendas? These questions that were discussed during an expert meeting held at the Gulf Research Center in Riyadh on December 1 and 2, 2024. The twoday event was organized as part of the Gulf Labour Markets, Migration and Population Programme (GLMM) of the Gulf Research Center (GRC) in cooperation with the Konrad Adenauer Stiftung Foundation (KAS) Regional Programme for Gulf States. The event gathered local and foreign academics, experts, and stakeholders from Saudi Arabia, Oatar, and the UAE, as well as from major migrant sending countries: India, Pakistan, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Tunisia, and Egypt and international organizations.

In this meeting 6 research reports and 6 policy briefs of the "Vision 2030 and the Socio-Economic Reform Process: The Future of Labour and Migration in Saudi Arabia" were presented and discussed as well as 8 research reports and 8 policy briefs of the "Highly Skilled Migration to the Gulf States: How Do GCC Countries Fare in the Global Competition for Talent?"

Webinars

In 2024, GLMM launched three webinars. The first webinar was on January 17, 2024 and was entitled: "Gulf-Born, Second and Third Generation Foreign Residents: A Resource for Gulf States."



The webinar featured six distinguished experts:

- Nasra M. Shah, Scientific Director of GLMM, Professor of Migration and Development, Lahore School of Economics, Pakistan
- Neha Vora, Professor of Anthropology, American University of Sharjah, UAE
- Gennaro Errichiello, SOAS University of London, UK
- Musaab Alkhatib, Research Associate at the Social and Economic Survey Research Institute, Qatar University, Qatar
- Areej Jamal, University College London, Social Research Institute, UK
- Nadeen Dakkak, Lecturer in World and Postcolonial Literatures at the University of Exeter, UK

Among other things, the speakers addressed three key questions:

- What is the socio-demographic and educational profile of Gulf-born, second and third generation foreign residents?
- What are their specific skills and competencies?
- How could existing policies be adapted in order to better channel the potential of these residents to Gulf states' socioeconomic development processes?

The second webinar was organized by GLMM and the Center for International and Regional Studies (CIRS)/Georgetown University in Qatar (GU-Q) and was entitled "Emerging Trends in Sub-Saharan African Migration to the GCC" on June 12, 2024.



Speakers of the webinar included: Mr. Lawrence Egulu - Commissioner for Employment Services, Ministry of Gender, Labour, and Social Development of the Republic of Uganda; Mrs. Aida Awel - Chief Technical Adviser, Labour Migration at International Labour Organisation (ILO), Addis Ababa; Mr. Paul Odhiambo - Independent Policy Analyst, Nairobi; Prof. Lahra Smith - Associate Professor and Director, African Studies Program, Georgetown University; Dr. Kristian Alexander - Senior Fellow at the Rabdan Security & Defense Institute (RSDI), Abu Dhabi; and Dr. Françoise De Bel-Air - Senior Fellow, GLMM.

The third webinar was organized by GLMM and the Center for Gulf and Arabian Peninsula Studies (CGAPS) and was titled "Aging in the Gulf Countries and Implications for Migration to the Region," on December 9, 2024.



This webinar discussed the current and possible future implications of aging in the Gulf states on migrants and migration dynamics and policies. It also examined how healthcare, labour and migration policies adjusted to socio-demographic changes, including the expansion of elderly, impact non-working resident foreign populations.

The webinar featured Jessica T. Maluch, Director of Strategy, Research, and Impact at the Sheikh Saud bin Sagr Al Qasimi Foundation for Policy Research in Ras al Khaimah, UAE; Idil Akinci, Lecturer in Social Policy at the University of Edinburgh; Nasra M. Shah, Professor of Migration and Development at the Lahore School of Economics, Pakistan and the Scientific Director of GLMM; and Luca Maria Pesando, Associate Professor of Social Research and Public Policy at New York University Abu Dhabi (NYU-AD), as speakers for the session. Imco Brouwer, Managing Director of the GLMM Programme at the Gulf Research Center Foundation, moderated the webinar.

On October 1-2 GLMM's Imco Brouwer participated in a meeting in Addis Ababa organised by the Friedrich Ebert Stiftung Africa Migration Policy Center (FES-AMPC) and the Ethiopian Human Rights Commission (EHRC) on the occasion of the presentation of a report by Free the Slaves entitled "From Illegal Migration to Human Trafficking: Dangerous Journeys across the Horn of Africa and the Arabian Peninsula."

GLMM Pakistan - (Gulf -) Canada

For the month of October Prof. Nasra Shah was a Visiting Professor at the Toronto Metropolitan University within the framework of The Canada Excellence Research Chair in Migration and Integration (CERC Migration) led by Prof. Anna Triandafillydou.

During her visit, Nasra focused on analyzing the socio-demographic and economic profile of this group based on secondary data.

Nasra also collected some primary data by conducting focus group discussions with selected professionals and their families. The initial work will form the basis of a larger study looking at transnational linkages of Pakistani migrants in Canada, their sense of identity and belonging to the host country, and their future plans. She also explored whether Pakistani migrants migrated first to the Gulf then subsequently further migrated to Canada and why.

Activities in 2024

GRC Attendance at COP16 in Riyadh

The Gulf Research Center Foundation (GRCF) received the provisional accreditation from the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) based on its active role in research and activities in the field of environment and combating desertification and land degradation. GRCF is one of the very

few organizations working in the Gulf that received the UNCCD accreditation. The GRC delegation to COP16 included: Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, the founder and Chairman of the Gulf Research Center, Dr. Ahmed Sager, Vice Chairman of the Gulf Research Center, Dr. Mohamed Abdelraouf, Environmental Security and Sustainability research Program Director, and Ms. Yara Almajed, Research Intern, Environmental Security and Sustainability Research Program.

GRC stand at COP16

The Gulf Research Center had a desk and banner within the stand of The Cooperative Society of Moringa and Desert Plants, in the Blue Zone area where GRC staff met and explained the GRC's mission, activities and publications to visitors especially in the environment field.



GRC organized three side events during **COP16:**

The first side event: The Role of CSOs in Combating Desertification. The event took place on 11 December 2024 at 2pm in the COP16 Blue Zone, Inspired by Faith pavilion. The event was attended by around 25 people from various civil society organizations and government representatives. **Participants** discussed the role of civil society, think tanks,

youth, women, indigenous people, and civil society organizations (CSOs) in combating desertification, droughts and land degradation. Also discussed was the role of citizen science in collecting data from remote areas that governments and international organizations cannot reach. In addition, the side event presented an initiative by GAIIA Foundation for tree planting and green certification to fight climate change and desertification.





The second side event: The Economic Use of Desert Areas in Fighting Climate Change in Arab Countries. The event took place on 11 December 2024 at 6 pm in the COP16 Blue Zone, Room

MET-06. Opening remarks were delivered by Dr. Ahmed Sager, Vice Chairman of the Gulf Research Center on behalf of Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, the founder and Chairman of the Gulf Research Center. Dr. Sager emphasized the urgency of addressing desertification and land degradation in Saudi Arabia and the GCC, where extreme climatic conditions and rapid socio-economic changes have intensified these challenges. He underlined the importance of initiatives like the Saudi Green Initiative—aiming to plant 400 million trees by 2030—and the Green Middle East Initiative, which fosters regional collaboration similar to the European Green Deal. He also stressed the role of international cooperation, nature-based solutions, and the active involvement of civil society, research institutions, and the private sector in combating desertification. Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 underscores the nation's commitment to environmental sustainability, making COP16 a milestone for global partnerships and actionable solutions to climate change.

The second opening remarks were delivered by Dr. Quentin Blommaert, of the Hydrogen/ Decarbonization Diplomacy Office (H2-diplo) of GIZ in Riyadh. Emphasis was placed on the fact that Saudi Arabia is making rapid progress in its renewable energy transition, driven by abundant solar and wind resources supported by robust government initiatives. A key development is the ongoing decarbonization of the country's energy mix, replacing hydrocarbon combustion with solar plants and other renewables. At the forefront of these efforts is the Decarbonization Diplomacy Office, established through a collaboration between Saudi Arabia and Germany, with implementation by the German International Corporation (GIZ). The initiative aims to decarbonize industries, accelerate economic diversification, and create value chains that integrate clean climate technologies.

The session was opened with praise for the Kingdom's progress and its commitment to achieving the best outcomes, while also fostering cooperation among the Gulf Cooperation Council countries and Yemen. Emphasis was placed on the importance of civil society in its diversity and the role of increasing local and international investments in the environmental sector

A distinguished group of experts discussed various topics, including the multiple uses of plastic, whether recycled or newly manufactured, with one surprising moment highlighting the importance of plastic. Others focused on investment opportunities and mutual interests to advance environmental safety agendas. The session also featured audience participation through questions and interactions that enriched collaboration between organizations and civil societies, promoting integration to achieve optimal outcomes.

Prof. Dr. Mohammed Alzuhairi, from the University of Technology-Iraq Al Mortaga Foundation for Development and Accredited Member, United Nations, presented "Land Degradation & Waste Resources" (Sustainable Solutions), which focused on land restoration by plastic. He discussed using waste plastic, which includes biodegradable hydrophilic polymers, to enhance soil properties. His analysis included pathways to reduce costs associated with manufacturing scale-up as well as renewable energy use and continued R&D.

Mr. Wassim Merheby CEO and cofounder of Verofax, presented his aim to help countries combat desertification by encouraging them to decarbonize their industries while equipping them with the necessary national tools and platforms to measure, report, and verify emissions reduction programs, particularly

from industrial use cases. A notable initiative in this regard is the European Union's Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM), which aims to prevent carbon leakage in markets exporting to the EU by creating a fair and accountable system.

He discussed the aim to promote this model globally, assisting countries in establishing robust national frameworks, including emergency systems for measuring, reporting, and verification (MRV). Such systems are essential to ensure transparency, drive decarbonization efforts, and support the transition toward sustainable industrial practices.

Dr. Daniel Krahl DIAPOL-CE- Policy Dialogue and Knowledge Management on Climate Protection Strategies, GIZ spoke on the German Ministry of Environment in global dialogues on sustainable planet protection strategies, focusing on West Asia and neighboring regions. He discussed that while [they] don't implement solutions directly, [they] facilitate political dialogue, knowledge transfer, and provide scientific and advisory support.



A key focus was nature-based solutions, which prioritize adaptation to climate challenges. However, implementation is complex due to competing land use, water conflicts, and the need to engage local communities. Involving locals from the start is essential to ensure ownership and sustainability, whether through community-based tourism, sustainable agriculture, or other economic opportunities.

Dr. Benjamin Smain shared his experience addressing climate insecurity hotspots. particularly in Iraq, where water scarcity and land degradation are major challenges.

In the Iraqi marshlands, livelihoods such as water buffalo herding and fishing face threats from overfishing, including unsustainable practices like electrofishing. Instead of criminalizing these practices, Dr. Benjamin suggested sustainable solutions through:

- 1. Community-agreed fishing pauses to replenish fish stocks.
- 2. Providing alternative tools like nets that protect small fish.
- 3. Gradual introduction of sustainable practices with local support.

Broader solutions require water infrastructure development and economic diversification, which Irag's resources can support if acted on promptly. Regional cooperation is also vital; successful examples like solar farms in Jordan or sustainable practices in Saudi Arabia can be adapted to Iraq's needs.

While scaling solutions is challenging, crises often drive innovation, especially when urgency creates opportunities for those most affected. Through local collaboration and targeted strategies, we can build resilience against climate challenges.

The third side event: Efforts to Combat Desertification in the Gulf Cooperation Council Countries: Case of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. The event took place on 12 December 2024 at 11 AM in the COP16 Blue Zone, Room MET-02 and was moderated by Dr. Mohammed Abdelraouf of the Gulf Research Center.









Opening remarks were delivered by His Highness Prince Miteb bin Fahd bin Faisal Al Saud, the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Environment and Combatting Desertification Association. His Highness Prince Miteb expressed his thanks to the Gulf Research Center for organizing this session and highlighted the importance of building effective partnerships to develop voluntary initiatives that contribute to supporting local communities to confront environmental challenges.

He presented the efforts of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia in making environmental sustainability one of its main objectives. He pointed out that a previous study indicated that about 24 billion tons of fertile soil are lost annually due to desertification, with more than one and a half billion people around the world directly affected by this dangerous phenomenon.

This highlights the role of civil society organizations, universities and research centers in the Kingdom to support the efforts of the government represented by all ministries, headed by the Ministry of Environment and all its affiliated national bodies and centers, as well as government funds.

He stressed community environmental awareness to pave the way towards building a sustainable and prosperous environment for future generations

Dr. Sager then spoke on the urgency of addressing desertification and land degradation in Saudi Arabia and the GCC, where extreme climatic conditions and rapid socio-economic changes have intensified these challenges. He underlined the importance of initiatives like the Saudi Green Initiative—aiming to plant 400 million trees by 2030—and the Green Middle East Initiative, which fosters regional collaboration similar to the European Green Deal.

He also stressed the role of international cooperation, nature-based solutions, and the active involvement of civil society, research institutions, and the private sector in combating desertification. Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 underscores the nation's commitment to environmental sustainability, making COP16 a milestone for global partnerships and actionable solutions to climate change.

The session began with Dr. Haris Yousef, CEO of GAIIA Foundation, who introduced the idea of giving a digital identity to the tree and called for the support of the authorities for the annual green certificate in his statement.

He referred to the efforts to obtain the green certificate "Emission Right" as a license to pollute, stating that "With the money we earn from a polluted economy, we are trying to clean the air. The question here is can environmental feasibility become a financial incentive and not a burden? The answer is yes."

He pointed out that one cubic meter gives us 70-100 thousand hectares of oxygen per year and stores about 500 grams of carbon and cools the atmosphere by the equivalent of 20 thousand deciliters per hour, in addition to other economic and environmental benefits. Using the technologies available in the Kingdom, artificial intelligence algorithms, we can confirm and measure these numbers and issue a renewable certificate that accompanies growth and contains the tree's data and measurements. Thus, he confirmed that they can give the tree a digital identity.

He also praised that here in the Kingdom everything is ready for the birth of Eco-money or coin and the first environmental bank in the world can be born so that the tree becomes the source of this money. The KSA Green Initiative is not only a beautiful initiative but it is the foundation that enables us to build a new environmental economy.

He called on the decision makers in KSA and the Middle East Green Initiative to support the annual green certificate capable of transforming the initiative into a global model for financial afforestation with the aim of financing afforestation. This model is capable of stimulating a new green economy.

Then Dr. Nasser. Saleh Alkhalifah, Professor of Agricultural Biotechnology and Chairman of the Board of the Cooperative Society of Moringa and Desert Plants presented the application of agricultural biotechnology on desert plantation explaining that it is a group of technologies in biochemistry, microbiology, plant physiology, and biophysics working together in favor of plant micropropagation and plant development by improving the genetical or chemical components to produce new materials of great value for humans.

Then Dr. Rashad Saeed Alghamdi the Director of National Laboratories & Seed Bank at the National Center for Vegetation Development & Combating Desertification presented the concept of water reuse as a nature based management solution for plant sustainability in dry environments.

Last but not least, closing remarks were made by Mr. Mohammed Ibrahim Al-Mohaisen, the Counselor to His Highness Prince Miteb bin Fahd Al Saud. He emphasized the pioneer efforts of Saudi Arabia in combating desertification locally, regionally and globally. He also presented the idea of establishing a civil society network for environmental associations working in the six GCC countries to coordinate efforts, as well as to hold positions in international forums like COP16. Capacity Building Workshop for UNEP Accredited Organizations



Dr. Mohamed Abdelraouf, Director of the Environmental Security and Sustainability Research Program co-organized an online workshop with the UNEP Civil Society Unit entitled 'Capacity Building Workshop for UNEP Accredited Organizations' which took place on January 17, 2024. The objectives of the Capacity Building Workshop were to:

- Increase understanding of how and where Major Groups and Stakeholders (MGS) can engage in UNEA-6 and its preparatory processes.
- Educate UNEP-accredited organizations on the Major Group modality to stakeholder engagement in UNEP.
- Develop a joint approach to Major Group coordination towards UNEA-6.

February 24 to 25, 2024: 20th Global Major **Groups and Stockholders Forum (GMGSF)**

Dr. Mohamed Abdelraouf, Director of the Environmental Security and Sustainability Research Program at the Gulf Research Center co-organized and participated in the 20th Global Major Groups and Stockholders Forum (GMGSF) held from February 24 to 25, 2024. The meeting served as the preparatory meeting for major groups and stakeholders attending the UN Environment Assembly. Talks were organized around the UNEA-6 theme of "effective, inclusive, and sustainable multilateral actions to tackle climate change, biodiversity loss, and pollution." Dr. Raouf as a co-chair of MGFC at the UNEP representing the Gulf Research Center Foundation, spoke in a number of sessions, including the opening, the dialogue with member states, as GEO 7 head, and in the closing sessions.

Dr. Mohamed Abdelraouf, Director of the Environmental Security and Sustainability Research Program at the Gulf Research Center participated in the sixth session of the United Nations Environment Assembly (UNEA-6) from 26 February to 1 March, 2024 at the

Environmental Security and Sustainability Program

May 2024 Activities



Dr. Mohamed Abdelraouf, the Director of the Gulf Research Center's (GRC) Program on Environmental Security and Sustainability, recently visited the GRC Riyadh office to further strengthen the Center's collaborative efforts in Saudi Arabia. During his visit, Dr. Abdelraouf held a series of strategic meetings with key stakeholders, including representatives from various Saudi ministries and institutions, to discuss and enhance cooperation on environmental security and sustainability initiatives.

The primary focus of these meetings was to align the objectives of the GRC's environmental program with the national priorities of Saudi Arabia, particularly in the context of Vision 2030. Dr. Abdelraouf engaged in detailed discussions with officials from the Ministry of Environment, Water, and Agriculture, and the discussions centered on identifying critical areas for collaboration, sharing best practices, and exploring innovative solutions to address environmental challenges in the Kingdom.

Dr. Abdelraouf emphasized the importance of a holistic and integrated approach to environmental security, highlighting how sustainable practices can contribute to economic diversification and long-term ecological balance. The meetings also provided an opportunity to outline joint research projects, capacity-building initiatives, and policy advisory services that the GRC can offer to support Saudi Arabia's environmental goals.

These interactions are aimed at creating a network of local experts and stakeholders who can work together to implement sustainable practices and policies effectively. Dr. Abdelraouf's visit concluded with a commitment from all parties to continue working closely together, leveraging the expertise and resources of the GRC to advance Saudi Arabia's environmental security and sustainability agenda. This visit marked a significant step in enhancing the partnership between the GRC and Saudi institutions, ensuring a collaborative approach to addressing the region's environmental challenges.


17 September 2024

Digital Compact." The event was well attended by governments, businesses, civil society, and the media.





Gulf Research Center (GRC) in COP 29

The Gulf Research Center Foundation, represented by Dr. Mohamed Abdelraouf, Environmental Security and Sustainability Research Program Director, participated in the 2024 United Nations Climate Change Conference or Conference of the Parties, COP 29 in Baku, Azerbaijan. GRC is a UNFCCC-accredited observer organization and participates in the daily coordination meetings of the Science and Technology Major Group.

The Gulf Research Center held various bilateral talks and meetings at COP29 to discuss potential cooperation and the development of climate talks. Bilateral talks included countries such as the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, the Kingdom of Morocco, China, Azerbaijan, Germany, the UK, Oman, and Thailand, as well as international organizations such as the UNDP, the OPEC Fund, the Islamic Development Bank, and the Islamic World Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (ICESCO) as well as many private companies and civil societies organizations.

Dr. Mohamed Abdelraouf spoke on November 14, 2024, on the need of good international governance for new emerging technologies of geoengineering for combating climate change at the Green Zone at COP 29 during a side

event at the Azersun Pavilion co-organized by the German Federal Ministry for Economic Affairs and Climate Change and the German Chambers of Commerce.

Dr. Raouf also participated in numerous official side events at various pavilions of countries and organizations on topics such as the new climate finance goal, the circular economy, accelerating the transition to clean energies, the possibility of achieving zero carbon by 2050, green cities, and climate financing strategies. This also included events for the launching of national and international initiatives such as the National Green Projects Initiative of Egypt and the China International Initiative on International Zero Carbon Cooperation for Island Countries.

The Role of Major Groups in the Science Policy Panel for Chemicals, Waste and Pollution Prevention

The Gulf Research Center Foundation, the United Nations Environment Program, Major groups at UNEP, and the Royal Society of Chemicals of the UK co-organized a webinar titled "The Role of Major Groups in the Science Policy Panel for Chemicals, Waste and Pollution Prevention" on May 21, 2024 to discuss possible engagement mechanisms of various major groups in the SPP.

The webinar was part of preparations for the Open-Ended Working Group 3 (OEWG3) on an SPP on chemicals, waste, and pollution prevention, which was held in Geneva in June 2024. The UNEP and the SPP secretariat presented the current draft documents and provisions for Civil Society Participation.

The science major groups presented the group initiative of establishing an SPP science alliance to follow the work of SPP when created. Different major groups presented their insights about different modalities and avenues for the effective engagement of major groups in the future work of the panel and its various sub-bodies and/or committees.





Food Security Forum in Light of Desertification and Climate Change in the Arab World 2024



On June 29, 2024, in recognition of World Day of Desertification and Drought, the Abu Dhabi Environmental Research Network, the Gulf Research Center, and The Association of Agricultural Research Institutions in the Near East and North Africa participated in a webinar titled "Food Security Forum in Light of Desertification and Climate Change in the Arab World 2024." The Forum supported the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 13, 15, and 17.

Ten experts from the following organizations participated in discussions on desertification, drought, and climate change as some of the most important environmental challenges facing the Arab region, exacerbating other environmental problems, whether water, air pollution, food security, etc.:

- The International Center for Agricultural Research in the Dry Areas (ICARDA)
- The Arab Center for the Studies of Arid Zones and Dry Lands (ACSAD)
- Environment Agency Abu Dhabi (EAD)
- The Gulf Research Center (GRC)
- The United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA)
- The Association of Agricultural Research Institutions in the Near East and North Africa (AARINENA)
- Abu Dhabi Environmental Research Network
- The Arab Union for Water and Food Security (AUWFS)
- Sulaiman Bin Abdulaziz Al Rajhi Charitable Foundation
- The Jordanian Society for Desertification Control and Badia Development (JSDCBD)
- Golden Grass Incorporated, Saudi Arabia

The experts presented a wide range of experiences and solutions to fight desertification and climate change. There are a number of policies that must be followed by countries affected by climate change and threatened by desertification. The most important policies are (but are not limited to):

- Climate change adaptation policies and procedures
- Sustainable rational management of water resources including water recycling
- Applying a basket of policy mix tools such as economic tools and legislation to stimulate sustainable agriculture

- Exchanging best practices and experiences between Arab countries who face the same challenges
- Investing in new technologies technology transfer (whether social, economic, administrative, or technological innovation)
- Encouraging the use of traditional and indigenous methods in agriculture whenever possible

It was noted that the success of the abovementioned policies is important to achieving the various Vision plans of the Arab countries including initiatives such as Saudi Arabia's Green Initiative and the Green Middle East. The full webinar can be viewed here.

Activities in 2024

The Gulf Research Center's Cultural & Media Program hosted the first roundtable seminar of a series of sessions focused on the topic: 'How can we build a national strategic vision based on the Arab moral system?' The symposium was moderated by the Director of the Cultural & Media program, Dr. Zaid Al-Fadeil. Participating in the roundtable was the editor-in-chief of the Encyclopedia of Arab and Islamic Ethics, Professor Dr. Marzuq bin Tinbak, who explained the details of his work.

During the symposium, the participants presented many recommendations that contribute to creating this vision and that can be implemented through education, television

programs, series, literary partners, and audio podcasts. The discussants were interested in developing mechanisms that make morality a feature of society, with the aim of strengthening its contents among members of society, starting from the foundation and education among children and ending with all aspects of society's culture and life in general. The roundtable is one of the tracks of the Cultural & Media program at the Gulf Research Center and aims to discuss many main ideas through a group of specialists and interested parties with the aim of communicating them to the responsible authorities and activating them within the strategic plans of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia in accordance with Vision 2030.



After the success of the Gulf Cultural Dialogue Labs series at the Gulf Research Center in 2023, the GRC, in cooperation with the Jordanian Narratives Laboratory held the first seminar of the Narratives Laboratory entitled "Features of Tourism,

Annual 14th Gulf Research Meeting 2024

Organized by the

Gulf Research Center



The Gulf Research Center (GRC) hosted its 14th annual Gulf Research Meeting (GRM) in Cambridge from July 9-11, 2024, attended by over 400 experts, scholars, and practitioners. The event's participants were spread out over 13 workshops overseen by 27 workshop directors. The workshops covered a host of issues ranging from security and conflict resolution to AI and climate change related to the Gulf region. The Gulf Research Meeting seeks to hold academic meetings that lead to publications on topics related to social sciences with a focus on the Gulf region. The GRM Opening Ceremony was moderated by GRC Director of Research Dr. Christian Koch and included welcoming remarks by Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the GRC, and Prof. David Cardwell, Pro-Vice-Chancellor for Strategy and Planning at the University of Cambridge. This was followed by speeches from H.H. Prince Faisal bin Farhan Al-Saud, Foreign Minister of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, H.E. Mr. Jasem Mohamed Albudaiwi, Secretary General of the Cooperation Council for the Arab States of the Gulf, H.E. The Rt Hon Patricia Scotland KC, Secretary-General of the Commonwealth, and H.E. Mr. Luigi Di Maio, European Union Special Representative (EUSR) for the Gulf region.

The second half of the opening ceremony featured a panel discussion with three distinguished women from the Gulf region, and was moderated by Dr. Christian Koch, GRC's Director of Research. Panel speakers included H.E. Sheikha Jawaher Ebrahim Duaij Al-Sabah, Assistant Foreign Minister for Human Rights, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, State of Kuwait, who shared insights on the role of women in peace and diplomacy, with a focus on human rights issues; H.E. Ambassador Nancy Jamal, Chief of Strategic Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Kingdom of Bahrain, who discussed her experiences in counter-terrorism, extremism. preventing and developing frameworks for sustainable security; and H.E. Dr. Manal Radwan, Advisor at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, who reflected on her involvement in highlevel security discussions and the evolving international political landscape.

Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center (GRC), welcomed all guests and participants and remarked on the challenges facing the region and the importance of "building bridges, allowing for spaces where discussions and exchange of views can occur." He stated that it was important to keep "an open door for a wide array of individuals and institutions to engage in deliberations that can overcome existing obstacles" through events such as the GRM.

Professor David Cardwell, Pro-Vice-Chancellor for Strategy and Planning at the University of Cambridge, warmly welcomed attendees to the GRM, highlighting the importance of collaboration, especially in light of current global conflicts. He noted the University of Cambridge's active engagement with the Gulf region through various academic and cultural initiatives and emphasized the critical need for research and dialogue on issues like economic

diversification, climate change, and artificial intelligence. He concluded by expressing optimism for productive discussions and new collaborations during the conference.

In his virtual address at the opening ceremony of the Gulf Research Meeting, H.H. Prince Faisal bin Farhan, Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, emphasized the importance of intellectual discourse in order to better understand regional dynamics. He stressed the need for a rules-based international order to prevent chaos and conflict, urging a commitment to international law and peaceful dispute resolution. H.H. Prince Faisal highlighted Saudi Arabia's dedication to regional stability, cooperation, and economic prosperity. He also called for an immediate ceasefire and renewed dialogue to resolve the Palestinian conflict, advocating for justice, equality, and mutual respect. Access the full speech here.

In his keynote speech, H.E. Mr. Jasem AlBudaiwi, Secretary General of the Cooperation Council for the Arab States of the Gulf, highlighted the relevance of the Gulf Research Meeting as a crucial platform for dialogue on all issues pertaining to Gulf regional affairs. Access the full speech here.

In her keynote address, the Rt Hon Patricia Secretary-General of the Scotland KC Commonwealth emphasized the importance of international cooperation in addressing global challenges. Highlighting the roles of international organizations like Commonwealth, H.E. detailed various initiatives undertaken by the Commonwealth aimed at sustainable development, climate resilience, and environmental stewardship. These include the Common Sensing Programme for disaster management, the Blue Charter for ocean conservation, the Common Earth Initiative for nature-based climate solutions, and the Clean

Ocean Initiative to tackle marine plastic pollution. The Secretary-General of the Commonwealth also introduced the Climate Finance Access Hub and the Common Space Initiative, which explores the potential of space technology for sustainable development. The overarching message was a call for unity and collaboration to build a sustainable, peaceful, and prosperous world. Access the full speech here.

In his keynote speech, H.E. Luigi Di Maio, the EU Special Representative for the Gulf Region, highlighted the importance of the EU-GCC strategic partnership. He emphasized the need for trust, collaboration, and the fulfillment of promises to achieve sustainable peace and prosperity. H.E. Di Maio emphasized the significance of diplomatic maturity in discussing shared understandings and differences, and he spoke about the transformative power of human connections. In terms of EU-GCC ties, he highlighted the potential milestone of a first-ever EU-GCC Summit to be held later in 2024, which he believes could be vital for shared security, prosperity, and global stability in these uncertain times. At the same time, he condemned threats to international navigation and maritime security as have recently occurred in the Red Sea. Access the full speech here.

TAFAHUM WA TABADUL Project

As a non-profit organization, the GRC engages in externally-funded research projects focusing on the Gulf region. Such projects allow collaboration with other institutions and creates a broader base for scholarship and research activities.









In 2024, the regional dialogue initiative Tafahum wa Tabadul convened official representatives from West Asia and the Arabian Peninsula (WAAP) - a region that subsumes the six member states of the Gulf Cooperation Council plus Yemen, Iraq, and Iran - for highlevel policy workshops.

The fundamental objective of the Tafahum wa Tabadul project is to outline a process for regional security in the WAAP region. In addition, it aims to generate an overall "understanding" (tafahum) among regional stakeholders on a collaborative process toward regional security followed by the identification and implementation of concrete areas of "exchange" (tabadul). The project is funded by the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs FDFA of Switzerland and implemented by CARPO and the GRCF



Gulf In-Depth Executive Learning Program







The Gulf Research Center organized, as part of its executive learning programs, the Gulf In-Depth Executive Learning Program, which took place at the GRC office in Riyadh from October 6 to 10, 2024. The Gulf In-Depth is a week-long program designed to deepen understanding of the strategic dynamics shaping the Arabian Gulf and its global interactions. The program commenced with a keynote address by H.E. Jasem Mohamed AlBudaiwi, Secretary General of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC), who emphasized the importance of collaboration among Gulf states. The program brought together 20 participants from 18 different countries, fostering comprehensive discussions on the region's dynamic transformations and highlighting the significance of regional cooperation and the evolving geopolitical landscape.

Spanning five days, each day of the program revolved around a key theme featuring 14 sessions that addressed a wide array of political, security, and socioeconomic changes in the Gulf. The first day focused on The Gulf in Transition, exploring current political dynamics and their implications for governance and stability. The second day featured discussions on The Political Environment in the Gulf Region, including the political position of the Gulf in a new world order, public policy formulation in the region, and an outlook on the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC). The third day examined The Gulf Economy, highlighting trends, diversification efforts, and growth opportunities. The fourth day addressed Gulf Foreign and Security **Issues,** discussing regional security challenges and the geopolitical landscape. Finally, the fifth day focused on The Gulf Moving Forward, with sessions dedicated to climate change and the role of the media in shaping perceptions of the region.

The program offers:

- Opportunities to learn from experts on Gulf society, culture, politics, economics, and security.
- Understanding the links between the Gulf and key strategic regions of the globe and what they mean for the development of the region.
- Uncovering the links between educational and social institutions, politics, economics, and media.
- Discovering possibilities for lucrative investment in one of the fastest-developing regions in the world.



Gulf Research Center & Ambrosetti Roundtable: "New Relevance of Saudi Arabia, the Gulf, and the Middle East - Global Perspectives"

January 15, 2024









The Gulf Research Center (GRC) and The European House - Ambrosetti (TEHA) jointly organized a roundtable on January 14, 2024 at the GRC Riyadh office titled "New Relevance of Saudi Arabia, the Gulf, and the Middle East - Global Perspectives." The meeting brought together academics, diplomats, and business community representatives to examine Middle East geopolitics from a nuanced perspective. Welcoming remarks were made by Dr. Abdulaziz Sager, Chairman of the Gulf Research Center, and Luca Miraglia, CEO of The European House - Ambrosetti Middle East & Central Asia. The event featured key speaker Federico Rampini, journalist, writer, and principal expert in geopolitics at TEHA. Guests included H.E. Roberto Cantone, the

Italian Ambassador to Saudi Arabia, and H.E. Christophe Farnaud, the EU Ambassador to Saudi Arabia.

In his talk, Mr. Rampini argued that several factors have enhanced Saudi Arabia's global relevance:

- The war in Ukraine redirected focus away from Russia, aligning Europe with the Gulf for energy supplies.
- The pandemic and the new Cold War between the West and China increased interest in Middle Eastern partnerships for manufacturing.
- The renewed interest in Africa's resourcerich landscape has led to collaborations with countries like Saudi Arabia.

- The Abraham Accords initially marked a geopolitical innovation, though the landscape shifted following the October 7th Hamas attack.
- Saudi Vision 2030 and implemented social changes have attracted global interest.
- The issue of democracy and human rights within Western countries: Democracy and human rights debates in the West may see improved relations with Saudi Arabia due to shifting political ideologies.
- The geopolitical posture of KSA: The growing alignment between Saudi Arabia and Russia in OPEC+ raises concerns in the US, offering opportunities for China and Russia
- The effects of the War in Gaza and the Red Sea turmoil highlighted Saudi Arabia's regional influence but also exposed diplomatic challenges.
- Business sentiment contradicts media narratives, as the business community sees Saudi Arabia as an optimistic, thriving market.

The discussions facilitated a thoughtful analysis of the changing geopolitical landscape, contributing to the discourse on the roles of regional powers such as Saudi Arabia in the international system.

The Gstaad Dialogue brings together – in a discreet, policy-focused annual dialogue – a diverse group of credible security and policy experts from the region to develop fresh thinking and pragmatic initiatives for addressing today's regional dilemmas. Participants will be selected from the expert community, as well as from policymaking circles, to ensure that there is an impact at the decision-making level.



By involving relevant governmental actors, diplomatic representatives, well-connected experts, and members of civil society, the Gstaad Dialogue serves as a Track 1.5 "theory-to-implementation bridge." Through open and robust discussions, it aims to identify common ground, distill important lessons, and produce actionable policy recommendations that will be conveyed to decision-makers for consideration. In addition, the Gstaad Dialogue serves as a laboratory for incubating and elaborating upon ideas that are being developed through ongoing dialogue in and about the Middle East.

Young Voices on Saudi-German Academic Exchange

Young Perspectives on Joint Cooperation: Enhancing the Saudi-German **Academic Exchange**



The Gulf Research Center (GRC), in cooperation with the Konrad Adenauer Stiftung, organized the program on 'Young Perspectives on Joint Cooperation: Enhancing the Saudi-German Academic Exchange'. The first session took place at the GRC's office in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, from October 5 to 7, 2023.

The program is aimed to increase academic exchange between researchers from Germany, on the one hand, and Saudi Arabia, on the other, by building and sustaining networks between individuals and institutions in both regions. Ten young researchers participated in the program, divided into separate two-person teams to work on specific issues and write a comprehensive policy brief on issues impacting Saudi-German ties. The workshop allowed for an initial exchange of views on such topics as Saudi Arabia and Germany in an era of energy transition, the strategic outlook of Saudi Arabia and Germany in a multipolar world, and Germany and Saudi Arabia in a period of social transition.

On June 11, 2024, the young researchers participated and presented their paper at the GCC-German Young Leaders Forum which was an exclusive side event of the 6th German-Arab Gulf Dialogue on Security and Cooperation organized by the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung (KAS) and the German-Arab Friendship Association (DAFG) in Berlin.

GRC's Annual Strategic Review 2024



The Gulf Research Center launched its Annual Strategic Survey on July 4, 2024. The chapters in this volume seek to provide some insight into how the Gulf countries have perceived the changing regional and international scene and how their role is central to the outcome of the developments taking place.

Key developments stand out when one looks at the Gulf's strategic environment and position as of 2024. The Gulf region continues to grapple with the devastating crisis in Gaza and the strategic repercussions it has had for the Middle East as a whole and puts the GCC states in a difficult position. The tragic events of October 7 were a stark reminder that stability in the region cannot be achieved until a just and equitable solution to the Palestinian issue culminating in the establishment of a Palestinian state is achieved. Unfortunately, the conflict continues unabated with the current Israeli displaying absolutely government willingness to undertake the necessary steps towards a resolution to the crisis. This undermines not only regional stability but also highlights the failure of the wider international community to push for and implement a needed response.

This volume also delves into the various focus issues that have emerged as key priorities when it comes to the Gulf, ranging from the security of the Red Sea, the question of reform of the GCC, and the Gulf's relations with Asia, in addition to key developments and challenges for the GCC labor markets.

The Gulf Research Center's goal is to foster informed dialogue and policy-making by presenting data and analyses that reflect the perspectives and priorities of the GCC states.
